We have implicit confidence in the integrity of our local men, and feel pleased to be able to communicate to the public, that no speculation will be entered knowingly in which their rights will be endangered, and so far as The Chronicle is concerned it shall be our aim to represent everything fairly so far as we know the circumstances connected with all public matters. At the present juncture it is not necessary to enter into details regarding the difficulty more than to say that no fear need be entertained, nor will further subscriptions now be taken


