

NORMANBY COUNCIL.

Council met pursuant to adjournment on Feb. 13th, all the members present. Minutes of former meeting were read and confirmed.

Auditors Heise and Duignan presented their report, which the council examined and found correct, report adopted and treasurer's accounts for the year, 1900 passed as finally audited.

Commissioner of northwest division to meet commissioners of Bentinck Tp. in due time for the purpose of opening a piece of road between lot 5, con. 18, of Normanby, and parts of lot 9 and 10, con. 3, South Durham Road, Tp. of Bentinck, and to report at May meeting.

Reeve and Clerk authorized to sign petition circulated by Tp. of Bentinck asking council to co-operate in petitioning the Legislature against establishing a system of county roads, petition to be forwarded to Dr. Jamieson, M. P.

Adam Pleisch appointed collector of taxes in division No. 1; Louis Brusso in Division No. 2; Thos. Wallace in Div. No. 3; salary to be respectively \$20, \$27, and \$23. By-law passed to confirm these appointments. M. O. MacFarlane is re-appointed township solicitor, James Edwards sanitary inspector.

By-law passed that no annual tax on dogs be levied in this township, as per authority of 53 Vic. Chapter 62, section 2, sub-section 2.

The school site decided by the Crown to the township being north east corner of first division of lot 7, con. 1, which is no longer required for school purposes, given to the trustees of the Maplewood cemetery, to fix up the old schoolhouse as a caretaker's residence and for other purposes.

M. B. Flynn's application to do this year's township printing for \$80 accepted by the council.

The following orders issued on treasurer: Auditors Heise and Duignan \$14 in equal shares; Jas. Morice, 50 feet planks for repairing culvert on new road at lot 26, con. 13, \$1.50; D. Hartman, 20 piles 25 feet long, \$60, 10 piles 30 feet long, \$15, total \$75; Louis Weber, repairing ice-break bridge at lot 64, con. 2 & 3, \$3; Joseph Shoen, repairing ice-break bridge and railing, Reid's bridge \$9.40; commissioner Gardiner, superintending and inspecting \$2; J. Sieling, driving piles, bridge, deviating road between lots 1 and 2, con. 18, \$1.50; Messrs. Morice, Ryan, Easton and Weinert for services at board of health meeting, \$8.60; councillors for services at meeting of date, \$12.80.

Next meeting will be held on Monday, April 16th, in town hall, to appoint postmasters, fence viewers, poundkeepers, and for general business. G. G. Hoff, Clerk.
