Rutledge, Jones and Rice have had their story often told, They are known all over North America as a trio of desperate men whose records earned both in Canada and the United States, lhave shown that they will stop at nothing. After the long legal fight which went against them in Chicago, they came to Toronto and behaved as well as men in their position could be expected to do.
