Wilson's assessment reduced \$50.00, the names of James Ford, Herbert Prupper, James McLowen, John Lochead, James McLeod, Duncan McGillivray and Bert Wilson were entered as Manhood Franchise Voters.

Michael McKenna, Robert Allon, J. Herbert Walker, Chas. A. Duncan, Michael Donald, Wm. McNally, George Stonehouse, Donald McKechnie, Mathew Scott and Chas. Kennedy, Jr., were entered as owners. Chas. Closs, Edward Bell, Henry Storey, Wesley Storey, John Kingston, Jr., D. C. McArthur, Leonel Robson, Duncan McRae and Oscar Konold were entered as tenants. The names of Robert and John McMeekin were changed for Lot 40, Con. 1, S. D. R., to Lot 45, Con. 1, S. D. R. The Assessment Roll as so amended was passed and ordered to be certified to by the Clerk and the court adjourned.

After adjournment of Court of Revision the council met for general business. All the members present. The roll in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Several communications were read and considered.

McCannel—Arrowsmith—That commissioner for ward 2 be granted \$30 for fill at Lots 22 & 23, Con. 2, N. D. R.—Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That an order be issued in favour of Jas. McNally for the sum of \$50 as part payment of contract at Lot 5, Con. 9, known as Glenecross bridge.—Carried.
