COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING.

(From the Owen Sound Times.)
In accordance with resolution of adjournment from January session, the county council of County of Grey met in the thriving town of Markdale, the sittings commencing on Monday evening at 7 o'clock.
Geo. A. Brown, the warden occupied the chair. The members were all present except the senior member for division No. 1, who was prevented being present until Tuesday morning.
The clerk announced the election on Anthony Shute as having been elected in the room and stead of the late Thomas Willisroft, and that Mr. Shute had made the declaration of qualification and office, and was entitled to take his seat as a representative for division No. 8.

The minutes of last day of January session were read and confirmed.
The warden addressed the council at considerable length, referring to various important matters likely to come up at this session. He said he was pleased to see them again gathered around the council board, in apparent good health and vigor. Since they last met death had claimed one of the number—Thomas Willisroft. His removal has caused widespread sorrow, but the warden was pleased that the vacancy had been filled by one in every way equal to a councillor. Among the important matters which would occupy the attention of the council would be the equalization of the county for assessment purposes. The report appeared to be considerable dissatisfaction throughout the county on account of the idea being abroad that some municipalities were rated too high while others were rated too low. He thought the proper thing to do would be to bring in valuations from outside, who would make an independent valuation upon the individual municipalities. This would cost money but he considered that it was the only proper way to arrive at a righteous and accurate valuation, and would be the means of removing a bone of contention. Another question which would come up at the present session, was the erection of a house of refuge. It seemed to him that this was from time to time becoming more and more necessary that some provision should be made for the aged and infirm. Some instances which he had knowledge of personally, impressed him with the absolute necessity for such an institution, in the hot ball match and other games. Spies were invited are Rev. Mr. Bray, Rev. Mr. Craigie, Hanover, Rev. Mr. Sharp, Dr. Jamieson, M. P. P., Mr. Richardson, M. P. G., Binnie, Dr. Taylor, Dr. Mearns, H. H. Miller and others.

Mr. Preston presented report No. 1 of finance committee.
Mr. Agnew presented report of special committee re the revision of the council's procedure by-law together with draft of new by-laws.
Mr. McDonald presented report of special committee in the matter of resolution of condolence to Mrs. Willisroft, with draft of letter.
A motion to amend the finance report and to make a grant of \$25 to the Poultry Association was made by Messrs. Doyle and Gordon, but was lost on a division of 7 to 4.
The report of special committee re letter of condolence together with draft was adopted by council.
The by-law to revise and amend the procedure by-law was introduced and read a first and second time, after which the council adjourned till 2 p. m. Wednesday.

The following documents were read by the clerk and referred to the committees:—Three accounts in connection with repairs to Owen bridge on county line, west, one half of the amounts being payable each by the counties of Grey and Bruce; account of R. Agnew, letting advertising space in the Education's creek; account of Joseph Bentley for repairs to bridge on town line of Proton and Egremont, \$5.00; account of Henry Mullin's bridge, county line of Grey and Wellington; account from township clerk of Sydenham for election expenses in the recent by-election, amounting to \$22.50; and account from the county clerk for \$10.40 refund of postage since January.
