FLESHERTON.
The celebration here on Dominion Day was a grand success and the immense crowd of visitors went home well pleased with the day's fun. Many last year were not out in time to witness the Trade's procession but were not to be disappointed this year and before ten o'clock the streets were thronged with an expectant crowd whose expectations were fully met in the spectacle witnessed by them. Our citizens in office and store and shop and factory turned out and vied with each other in making this part of the celebration a success. There were some fine decorative effects. M. Richardson & Co's. van, W. A. Armstrong and J. Nuhn's wagon being specially good. The drawn and muscle of labor were splendidly represented on several floats by operatives at work. Bells clanged, bells blown, anvils rang and on one of Heald & Sons' floats a horse was shod during the parade. At 10 o'clock the procession formed at the Baptist Church and led by the Collingwood Band for nearly an hour paraded the principal streets, going to and from the Agricultural grounds before dispersing. The following was the order observed: Policeman in full costume, Dr. Emerson Henderson, of Toronto, who was a characteristic Hibernian and wielded the baton with effect; Collingwood Band; Mr. K. N. Henderson, President of Committee in white painted carriage with liveried coachman; Mr. M. K. Richardson, M. P., and Dr. Boyle in carriage; committee, 10 on horseback; Artemesia council in carriage; M. Richardson & Co's drygoods van; F. G. Karstedt's hardware van, a very attractive display; Flesherton Band; P. Louck's flour; John Hale's carpenter shop in very neatly framed building; Thompson's bakery; Herd & Sons, blacksmith shop, carriage works and bicycle shop, on three waggon; Lloyd & Scully, butter and eggs; W. Moore, harness maker, workman at the bench; W. Clayton, boots & shoes, a fine display; D. McTavish, blacksmith and carriage works well represented; M. K. Beaton, timber dealer with large stack of timber and workmen thereon; Vandeleur String Band gave much amusement with their music and unique outfit; F. A. Baker, tailor shop, machines humming; John Nuhn, woolen mills, loom and spindles in operation; T. Bulmer, photographer, picture not yet developed; Charles Stewart, dairy, dog churn in operation and the whole much admired; A. Wilson, barber shop and laundry, two wagons a good representation; W. A. Armstrong, jeweller, very artistic display; T. Sheppard, drygoods well represented; Dentist Murray, unique representation operating on dummy; J. P. Otwell, Massey-Tancred implements, very attractive; W. H. Bunt, furniture, a nice display; W. H. Thurston, the Advance Job press printing and distributing dealers; a large elephant and several monkeys were excellently represented and kept their keepers busy and equally engaged the attention of the spectators. The clowns were as usual the cynocure of all eyes. A mounted Calithumpian band of about a score from Eugenia under the command of Capt. Carr were a unique aggregation and brought up the rear with good effect. Their "long tom" firing and cheering for King and country was a splendid closing of the morning program. Eugenia won the Calithumpian prize and J. W. Herd & Sons the prize for the best trade representation in the best trade. In the afternoon the gate receipts at the Agricultural grounds were about \$250.00 and a program of lacrosse, races, etc., was carried out but have been, at time of writing unable to get the results other than Orangeville vs Markdale lacrosse was won by the former, 8 to 4. The concert in the evening given by Mr. Cameron and Mrs. Wright with Mr. M. K. Richardson in the chair was well patronized and at the conclusion a fine display of fireworks was given under the management of Mr. K. N. Henderson to whom much of the success attending the celebration must be attributed. The Ladies Aid of the Methodist church served meals on Monday and received a liberal patronage.

On Tuesday, of last week, as Mr. Trimble's bus was coming in from the Station when opposite Hill street at Mr. Herd's shop, a horse belonging to Mr. W. A. Armstrong, which ran away from its own stable where it was about to be unhitched from the buggy, dashed down the street and instantly coming up to the broad side of the bus, bounded across it at the dashboard, overturning it in its flight. Percy Trimble, the driver, and a little boy of Mr. Wm. Tucker's were the only occupants of the bus and miraculously escaped injury. Both vehicles were considerably damaged and the runaway horse received some wounds.
