Deputations waited on him last session, but owing to the unsettled state of the Manitoba question, then before the Privy Council he was unable to give a definite answer further than his willingness to give the province all the prohibition the law would al low as soon as the judgment of the Privy Council was made public. The decision has now been given and as another session of the legislature is announced before dissolution, the government in power will be called upon to assert their position. Premier Ross himself, has always been an advocate of temperance, and having gone so far as to promise what he die it is only reasonable to expect he will make a bold show at carrying out his promises and pre-election pledges at least may be looked for.
