GENERAL NEWS.

Prof. G. D. Roberts addressed the Toronto Canadian Club on Canadian Literature.

John Hamilton, proprietor of the Working Men's Home, has been arrested on a charge of conspiring to defraud.

North Grey complete returns make Mr. Thomson's majority 202.

Rev. J. W. MacMillan, late of Lindsay, was inducted into the pastorate of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Winnipeg.

A counter-petition has been filed by Mr. John Brown, M. P. P., North Perth, against Mr. John C. Monteith, his Conservative opponent.

The Canadian General Electric Co. will spend half a million dollars in Peterboro' this year for new buildings and equipment.

Rev. J. W. Graham of Montreal announces that he has within \$20,000 of the \$182,000 necessary to save St. James Methodist Church from the creditors.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. has awarded the contract for double-tracking the line from Rat Portage to Fort William.

At the annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association at Ottawa Lord Dundonald made an important speech on the poor equipment of the Canadian artillery.

The Government steamer Minto managed to free herself from the ice in Northumberland Strait, and left a supply of coal on the ice for the other ice-bound steamer, the Stanley.

Fire at Cincinnati (O.) did damage aggregating \$2,000,000.

Sir John Terence Nicolais O'Brien, formerly Governor of Newfoundland, is dead.

British railway companies will adopt a uniform electric equipment for their lines.

Newspapers and general public opinion in Bulgaria condemn the proposed reforms in Macedonia as entirely inadequate.

The King has conferred the Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George on Sir Michael Herbert, the British ambassador at Washington.

The address in reply to the King's speech at the opening of Parliament was adopted by the British House of Commons without amendment.

A despatch to a Vienna newspaper from Constantinople announces that M. Rulog, Russian Consul at Mitrovitza, Albania, has been murdered by natives.

Died Alone at Yeovil.
 Alexander MacGregor had farmed in Egremont for nearly forty years, but had lived retired in Yeovil for the past year or so. Of late he had not been well, but was able to be about. Mr. Wm. Romain and Mrs. James Dickson were in to see him on Friday, and he seemed much as usual. On Saturday forenoon, not being seen around the house, Messrs. Chas. McInnes and John Neilson went to the house, and finding the door locked and getting no response to their knocks, forced their way in and found the old man dead, undressed, under his bed. Coroner C. A. Jones was at once communicated with, and he in turn sent word to the County Crown Attorney. Not receiving any reply for three hours he issued a warrant to hold an inquest and sent out Chief Stovel to summon the jury. Coroner Jones went to Yeovil on Monday with a view to holding the inquest, but after making careful inquiry decided that there was no reason to suspect foul play and did not impanel the jury, but withdrew the warrant and issued a warrant for burial instead. Among those present, most of whom were jurors, were the following:—Chas. McInnes, Jas. Shiels, Alex. Drimmie, John Rice, James Brown, Robert Nicholson, Alex. Chief Stovel on reaching the premises found \$25.75 in the house. Some wood on hand was sold for \$15.50, so that a descent burial was drovid for. A bank book showed a balance of over \$2000, and the deceased also owned two houses and lots in the village. No trace of a will was found and no relatives are known, though about twenty years ago a nephew was with him.—Mt. Forest Confederate.
