

### A POISONOUS WINTER BUG.

Drives a Young Farmer a Raving Maniac—Investigator Also Bitten.

Mendon, Mich. March 27.—Excitement runs high in Mendon, another man having been bitten by the poisonous winter bug. Hon. De Vos Olinberg, the famous entomologist, of Wheeling, W. Va., is the latest victim.

The case of Oscar Newasky, the young farmer, who became a raving maniac as a result of being bitten by the winter bug, baffled medical science. Physicians from a distance have been summoned, but are unable to conquer the terrible swelling of the body which began the day following the biting.

Prof. Olinberg came here in the interest of the National Museum at Washington to procure specimens of the hideous bug, which was supposed by scientists to have become extinct, especially in the Northern States. Olinberg examined the specimen preserved after being stung by Newasky, and began a search among the sloughs and bog in the vicinity. He discovered a nest of the insects, and in his endeavor to capture them he was attacked by one, receiving a painful bite on the chin. In his attempt to reach a neighboring farm house he began to reel and stagger, and within an hour had relapsed into a semi-conscious condition. Medical assistance was called, but scientific treatment is still unable to relieve him.

Olinberg is the author of "Half Hours with Insects" and "The World of Wings," and has been a contributor of scientific writings to Government publications. In 1886 the degree of Fellow of the Academy of Science was conferred upon him in England. He has been State chemist of West Virginia, and is well known as a scientific lecturer.

### Flesherton.

Intended for last week.

Artemesia Township Auditors' report for 1902 in a neatly printed pamphlet of twenty pages, recently issued from the Advance office here shows the receipts for the year to be as follows:—Balance on hand, \$431.34; taxes, \$14,269.94; fines, \$11.00; licenses, \$123.03; loans, \$2,540.00; miscellaneous, \$83.77; total, \$17,409.08. Expenditure as follows:—Salaries, etc., \$938.37; stationery and printing, \$125.21; law costs, \$21.52; roads and bridges, \$1650.35; charity, \$232.05; county rate, \$1,721.10; schools, \$6,690.30; board of health, \$14.50; coupons and debentures, \$332.00; loans, \$2560.45; sinking fund, \$473.24; Flesherton police trustees, \$407.97; miscellaneous, \$253.53; total, \$15,410.59, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,998.49. Flesherton Police Trustees' total receipts, \$694.21; expenditure:—On streets, \$407.97; proportion of salaries, expenses and interest, \$57.97, leaving a balance of \$228.27.

The members for Grey, M. K. Richardson, Dr. Sproule and T. I. Thompson, were pleased to notice by their vote in the House of Commons last week among the number whom the Weekly Sun, Toronto justly designated "real friends of the farmers." On motion by Hon. Blair to refer Mr. Lancaster's catleguard bill to the Railway Committee, where by a vote of 99 it was sent and will, in all probability, be buried. Grey's representatives, with 50 others, protested against this injustice to the farmers.

As we write (Monday) the news has reached us of a sad accident resulting in the death of Miss Scott, of Osprey. Miss Scott had been at the station with her brother who was returning to Belleville College, and was on her way home. When a mile from home the tongue fell from the neck-yoke causing the horses to run away and upset the rig. She was dragged by the lines for some distance, and when picked up was unconscious and died soon after.

The 31st Reg., Grey County, is, we believe, the only regiment in the Brigade to which it belongs that is without a set of colors. A movement has been on foot for some time to raise the required funds to purchase the same, and some parts of the county have responded nobly; but we understand nothing has been done by this section of the county represented by No. 6 Company located here. The project is, we believe, in some form to be started here, and we have no doubt but that the members of No. 6, new and old, and the loyal citizens of this section will as cheerfully contribute their quota as has done any other part of the county. If the good citizens of this section will "Herald the news," "Rally round The Standard" and "Sound The Advance," we shall, in due time, be able to "Chronicle" the going forth in glory of the 31st "terrible as an army with banners."

### What the Independent Order of Foresters is Doing.

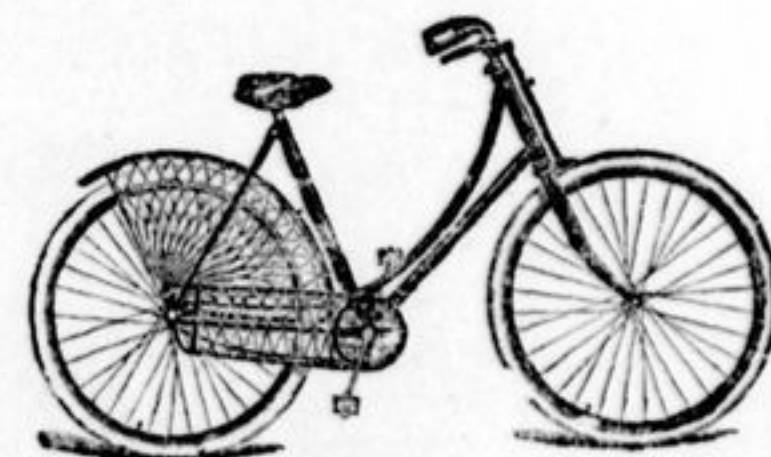
