TO REEVE AND COUNCIL OF GLENELG. GENTLEMEN,—I beg leave to draw your attention to the state of the road between Lots 49 and 50, Con. 3, E. G. R., known as Allan's swamp, a portion of said road having been impassable for over two years. I think it high time that something was done to protect the travelling public. You must be aware that accidents of a serious nature have already occurred and on more than one occasion. Mr. D. Davis nearly lost one of his horses by drowning. Mr. Grasby also had experiences in the same place that he will not soon forget. Had Mr. Davis lost his horse it certainly would have cost the township more than would have repaired the road. Whether the council as a body knows the state this road is in, I am not aware but one member of the council, at least, must know all about it. The Commissioner for Ward No. 1 has to travel over it every time he goes to Durham, and why has he neglected it so long? Is it because they don't know how to proceed, or are our finances so low? I will offer to you, free of charge, my opinion, and I may safely say the opinion of every person that travels that road. Call upon a surveyor and locate a drain across Lots 50 and part of 51 to connect with culvert on Con. 2, west of Lot 51, and you will find there will be no more trouble from that source. It will be the imperative duty of the surveyor to tax the owners of these farms to the full amount of the benefit they receive and let the township pay for what benefit it receives. This is the only solution of this troublesome question that is going to satisfy the taxpayers of Glenelg. I hope you will attend to this at once and give us a decent road.
