Jno. H. Brown-McLachlan-That the prayer of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on George St. be granted with the exception of that portion from Garafraxa St. to Queen St., which shall be built within one foot of outside line, and that the petition of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on Bruce St, be granted in full, and that action be taken at once to comply with the statutes .-Carried.

Jno. H. Brown-McLachlan-That the prayers of ratepayers asking for granolithic sidewalk on Lambton St. be granted, and that action be taken at once to comply with the same according to statutes .- Defeated.

Health Inspector Warner reports finding the town in a favorable condition with the exception of some three or four places, the parties promising to comply with the regulations at once.

Neglected and Dependent Chilldren of the County of Grey.

The above was the subject of an exceedingly interesting address given Tuesday night in the Town Hall by Rev. Jas. Lediard, the Agent of the Children's Aid Society. Mr. Lediard is the master of a persuasive eloquence and he employs it in his plea for Neglected Children. They are, he says, the country's and the churches' best assets and no pains or expense are too much to train them to good citizenship. The following facts came out in the address:

There are about 30 C. A. Societies in the province. Over 2,000 children have been rescued and placed in homes. Of these nearly 100 belong to this county and are wards of this society.

Many instances were given of cruelty and neglec; and immoral surroundings from which children had been removed by the speaker and by the very efficient help of Constable Jas.
