OBITUARY.

FLORA M'COORMACK.

We regret to chronicle the death of Flora McCoormack, widow of the late John McKinnon at the age of 73 years. After many weeks of suffering borne with Christian patience, she passed to her long home on Sabbath morning, June 7th, at her home near Rocky Saugeen.

The deceased was a native of the farm of Ross Suis Mull, Argyleshire, Scotland. She came to this country in 1846 with her mother and brothers. The family settled at the time about one mile north of the Rocky in the township of Glenelg. In March, 1856, she married John McKinnon, who pre-deceased her twenty-five years ago. To them were born eight sons and one daughter. Seven sons remain to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother. The sons are Chas., John and Allan, of Durham; Donald and John Jr., Toronto; Malcolm, Port Arthur, and Angus, at home. All were present at the last sad rites excepting Malcolm. She also leaves two brothers, Alexander and Archibald McCoormack, of Bentinck. The deceased was of a kind and affectionate disposition, loved and respected by all who knew her. The bereaved sons will mourn her loss, but not as those who have no hope of a blessed reunion. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon to the Rocky Saugeen cemetery and was a very large one. The six grief-stricken sons of the deceased acted as pall bearers. On the handsome casket was a pillow of beautiful flowers, inscribed with the word, "Mother." The Rev. Mr. Farquharson conducted an impressive service at the house and grave.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The council met May 26th, and after making the necessary Declarations organized as a Court of Revision. All the members present, the reeve was appointed as chairman. Changes were made as follows: Alex. Lyons assessed for lot 19, con. 9, Dugald McKechnie assessed for lot 9, con. 2 E. G. R. instead of Robert McClyment, Wm. H. Billings assessed for the Mortimer property instead of Arch. McLean, assessment of Jas. G. Ross was reduced to \$1500, Lionel Robson entered as tenant for lots 3 and 4, con. 1, N. D. R., Archie Little entered as tenant for lot 13, con. 1, S. D. R., Thos. Jack and Joseph Young assessed for west and east half of lot 1, con. 12, respectively, Geo. Twamley assessed for lot 10, con. 3, E. G. R., Wm. D. Davis entered for lots 1 and 2, con. 3, N. D. R., George McKechnie entered for lots 2 and 3, con. 2, N. D. R., Mat Scott assessed for his Priceville lots, Emma Brown's assessment reduced to \$300, Richard Banks was assessed for South half of lot 30, con. 3, E. G. R. The assessments for Thos. C. McGirr and Wm. Etor were reduced \$50 each. The assessment of J. A. Carson was reduced \$40.

Revision Court adjourned to June 13 at 1 p. m.

After adjournment of Court of Revision, the Council met for general business. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The treasurer presented his statement of receipts and expenditures up to date. Communications read as follow: David McIntyre re townline G. and E.; from Robert Legate re railway bonusing; from Hugh McDonald and 27 others petition re townline G. and E.

Arrowsmith—Kerney—That the ward appropriation be \$200 for each division and that no commissioner exceed that amount without the sanction of the council.—Carried.

Kerney—Sullivan—That Thomas Dunn be paid \$1.25 per week of Mrs. Furneux until further notice is given commencing 13th of April 1903.—Carried.

Davis—Kerney—That the clerk be and is hereby instructed to again notify the councils of Holland and Bentinck to forward to the treasurer of Glenelg their share of cost of repairs on townlines G. and H. and G. and B. and if not paid within a reasonable time that our solicitor be instructed to take legal action for the collection of the same.—Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That the reeve and commissioner for ward 1 be a committee to wait on the owner of lots 49, 50 and 51, con. 3, E. G. R., to arrange terms of grant in regard to opening ditch across said lots and report at next meeting of council.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That the assessor be paid \$25, being balance of salary as assessor for 1903.—Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That Geo. Furneux be paid \$4 balance due him for keep of Mrs. Furneux, and that Owen Sound Hospital be paid \$51 for keep of Miss Wise.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—Kerney—That A. S. Walker be paid \$45 for work at lot 98, townline G. and A. ½ cost, also Geo. Leitch \$75 pt. pay on timber for bridge at lot 20, con. 11.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That Jno. Staples be paid fifty cents for repairing bridge at lot 56 con. 2, E. G. R., also Hugh Baird \$2.50 for new tongue and other repairs to road scraper.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That the reeve and Mr. Kerney be a committee to examine the roads at lot 6, con. 9, and report at next meeting of council.—Carried.

The council adjourned to June 13, at 10 a. m.
