COUNTY COUNCIL.

June Session Held in Markdale.

In accordance with resolution of adjournment from January session, the County Council of the County of Grey met in Marsh's Hall, Markdale, on Monday, the 15th inst. The members were all present excepting Mr. Doyle, who was detained owing to the serious illness of his father. The Warden took the chair at 2 p. m., and after the roll was called and the minutes of last day of January session had been read and signed, he briefly addressed the Council. He said he had attended council meetings in the past when there were vacant chairs, owing to removals by the hand of death, but he was pleased that this time there were no vacancies from this cause, but all were able to be in their places through the ordering of a kind Providence. He congratulated the Council on the fair prospect of a good crop; also upon the satisfactory progress being made upon the work of the erection of the House of Refuge. He judged that the County officials having charge of the work had faithfully done their duty. Important business would be laid before the Council at this session, particularly the equalization of the County assessment. From what he knew of the gentlemen who compose the Council, he was satisfied they would do for the best interests of the County, giving their best thought and attention to the business which would be brought before them.

The Clerk presented and read the following documents, which were severally referred by the Warden to the standing committees to which they respectively belonged, as noted:

County Treasurer's estimates for 1904, showing that the sum of \$39,000 would be required to be levied, being \$8,000 in excess of the estimates of last year, largely owing to the expense in connection with the erection and maintenance of the House of Refuge, bridges, etc.

A copy of the Presentment of the Grand Jury at the recent sittings of the County Court and General Sessions referred to the Finance Committee.

A brief report from Rev. James Lediard, agent of the Children's Aid Society, showing a summary of the work of society since the last report, and asking the usual grant of \$100 to the Society, sent to the Finance Committee.

Circular letters were received from the Eastern and Western Ontario Good Roads Association respecting meetings of general interest.—Referred to Road and Bridge Committee.

An appeal from certain ratepayers of School sections one, five and twelve of the Township of Sydenham, against the action of the Township of Sydenham in refusing to take action in the matter of re-arranging the school sections. This arises out of the transfer of that portion of Owen Sound which was last fall transferred to the Township of Sydenham. The matter was referred to the Education Committee.

Electoral District Agricultural Society's annual report was presented and referred to the Finance Committee.

A statement from Mount Forest High School of account to be paid to that school for extra maintenance for pupils attending from townships of Egremont and Normanby. Referred to Education Committee.

Statement from the Department of Education of the amounts granted to the public schools of the county, and the same was referred to the Education Committee.

An application was received from Lt.-Col. A. G. Campbell of the 31st Regiment asking for the usual annual grant to the Battalion and application was referred to the Finance Committee.

Report of North Grey Farmers' Institute for 1902, sent to Finance Committee.

Application from Central Grey Agricultural Society of Walters Falls for a grant to the funds of the Society. Referred to the Finance Committee.

An application of Edward Fitzgerald for a free pedlar's license was referred to Finance Committee.

Application of George Ries, of Hanover, to be appointed caretaker of House of Refuge—sent to House of Refuge Committee.

A request from the Board of Education of Owen Sound to have a deed of land, granted in 1856 by the Government of Canada for a grammar school site, as it is not suitable for the purpose for which it was granted. Referred to the Education Committee.

An application from W. J. Blakeston of Dundalk to be appointed caretaker of the House of Refuge.

An account from Owen Sound for cost of constructing a granolithic sidewalk at Registry office, Owen Sound.

Account from Messrs. Lucas, Wright & McArdle for \$7.00, fees in the purchase of the Marsh farm; also an account of Messrs. McKay & Sampson, County Solicitors, for \$14 and \$35 respectively, for fees in connection with the purchase of site for House of Refuge—sent to House of Refuge Committee.

A letter from President Mills of Ontario Agricultural Society re the matter of county students at said college—sent to the Finance Committee.

An account from the McCallum Co. for \$15 for miscellaneous printing in-

cluding magistrate's forms—sent to Printing Committee.

A card from the Deputy Minister of Education stating the amount of grant to the Collegiate Institute of \$1228.17, and to the Meaford High School of \$800.83—sent to the Education Committee.

A circular from the "Laura Secord Memorial Fund Committee" asking for a small grant to aid the fund—referred to the Finance Committee. Continued on page 5.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The Council met June 13th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair.

Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The committee appointed to confer with owners of lots 49, 50 and 51, con. 3, E. G. R., put in their report and stated that no terms could be made with owner of lot 50, and therefore nothing in the way of draining the road could be done.

The committee appointed to examine roads at lot 6, con. 9, reported that a bridge at said lot on the original road allowance would be very expensive, and that a deviation as proposed would also be very expensive on account of the rocky nature and the steep gradients to be encountered. A communication from Lucas, Wright & McArdle in relation to townlines and the responsibilities of keeping the same in repair was read.

Arrowsmith—Sullivan—That Randall McDonald be paid \$19 for work done at Barhead mills.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That cheques issue for the following road jobs:—David Davis \$25.50 for graveling at lot 59, con. 2, E. G. R., D. J. McNab \$22.50 and \$19.20 for graveling at lots 58 and 59, con. 2, E. G. R., and Charles Arnett \$1.75 for repair of bridge at lot 6, con. 2, N. D. R.—Carried.

Sullivan—Kerney—That John Eckhardt be allowed 4½ days and John Kennedy ½ day for shoveling snow in 1901, and that the same be allowed them in their statute labor for 1902.—Carried.

Kerney—Sullivan—That the clerk be instructed to notify Mr. Hunt, of Dornoch, to either fulfil the law in regard to subway at lot 13, baseline, or fill up the same and lease it as he found it, and that he attend to this matter forthwith.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That the reeve is hereby authorized to draw on the treasurer the necessary funds to pay expenses of bridge at lot 20, con. 11, as work progresses.—Carried.

Kerney—Arrowsmith—That John McNally be paid \$25 for damages to buggy on defective road at lot 10, con. 11.—Carried.

Davis—Sullivan—That the reeve and clerk issue cheques in favor of I. B. Lucas for legal advice.—Carried.

Sullivan—Davis—That commissioners for Wards 3 and 4 be paid \$5 each for commission on expenditure.—Carried.

Sullivan—Arrowsmith—That the reeve and Mr. Davis be paid \$4 each and Mr. Kerney \$2 for committee work.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—Kerney—That the clerk be paid \$1.74 for postage.—Carried.

The council adjourned to July 11 at 10 a. m.

The council then went into Court of Revision and made changes as follows: The assessment of lot 24, con. 11, was reduced to \$900, Michael and John McGrath were assessed for lot E. § of 16, con. 4, N. D. R., instead of George McRae, John McKechnie was entered for lot 23, con. 2, E. G. R. With these changes the Roll was passed and handed over to the council and the court arose.

Robb superintending driving piles for railing, \$1; J. W. Walls 42 yards gravel, \$2.10; injury to crop hauling gravel, \$1; A. Peckover culvert 5th sideroad, con. 10 and 11, 6 ft. span railed, \$18; a new bridge 5th sideroad, con. 8 and 9, 8 ft. span railed, \$26; rep. culvert 5th sideroad, con. 8 and 9, \$3.

McIntyre—Gordon—That report be adopted and Comr. receive \$4 com. fees.—Carried.

Comr. McQueen reported grading 15th sideroad con. 6 according to instruction, total cost \$24.50; grading on deviation con. 6, total cost \$16; pathmasters used grader 7 days in said division, operators pay \$14; repairs for grader 60c.; road jobs, Geo. Keith railing and repairing McNair's cattle pass, \$20; cutting hill same place, \$15; John Keith cutting hill lot 18, con. 6, \$25; Jos. Robb railing Robb's bridge, \$9. Work completed.

Comr. Robb reported on grader—W. Bye operating grader one day, \$2; George Eakett do 3½ days, \$7.50; do taking grader to Yeovil for repairs 25c., doubletree for grader, \$2.

Comr. Robb reported examining road lot 1, con. 13, and found that cost to change roadbed would be great, and according to the stakes planted would recommend that Mr. Smith put his fence out to the line.

McIntyre—McFadden—That foregoing report be adopted and Comr. Robb see that Mr. Smith keeps his fence in the right place.—Carried.

Robb—McFadden—That the request of Mr. Findlay re sidewalks in Dornoch be laid over till next meeting of council for further information.—Carried.

Gordon—Robb—That Comr. McFadden meet Comr. Davis, Glenelg, to grade and gravel a portion of townline and railing a bridge.—Carried.

McFadden—Robb—That Comr. McIntyre be granted \$15 to grade and gravel 15th sideroad con. 17 and 18.—Carried.

McIntyre—Robb—That Comr. McFadden be granted \$20 to expend on Varney sideroad.—Carried.

Comr. Robb reported on watercourse in Orchardville—Found culvert blocked preventing escape of water, consulted Mr. Pinder regarding the site of his barn changing the natural watercourse, but he does not think that has anything to do with it.

McIntyre—McFadden—That foregoing report be adopted and Comr. receive \$1 com. fees.—Carried.

Robb—Gordon—That Comr. McQueen be instructed to examine the road at lot 28 and 29, con. 10, and report at next meeting.—Carried.

McIntyre—Gordon—That W. Hastie, assessor, be paid \$4 for equalizing U. S. S. 14, Egt. and Normanby, said sums to be charged against said S. S. respectively.—Carried.

Robb—Gordon—That the clerk be instructed to notify Mrs. Kelly to remove her fence off base line.—Carried.

McIntyre—McFadden—That the reeve and Comr. Gordon and Robb be a committee to examine the Russell bridge and also Drewrey's bridge and report at next meeting.—Carried.

Robb—McFadden—That Comr. Gordon inspect the driving of the piles at Ferguson's bridge.—Carried.

McIntyre—Gordon—That the reeve be appointed to examine the road at lot 10, con. 10, and get legal advice to see if fence should be moved or not.—Carried.

Resolved that the following accts. be paid:—Joseph Campbell gravel, \$2 10; reeve 2 days distributing pathrolls, \$4; clerk do, \$2; clerk's quarter salary, \$85; do postage, stationery 6 months, \$4.50; Comr. Gordon telephoning, 40c.; Mrs. Taylor use of hall, 50c.

Robb—Gordon—That we now adjourn to meet in Holstein on Wednesday, July 8th.—Carried.
