RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The subscription of one dollar to be paid on or before the first day of September, after that date one dollar and fifty cents will be required to become members.

2. One dollar on all the prizes to be retained by the Society as next year's subscription. Prize money not claimed by the first of December will be forfeited to the Society.

3. Animals or articles must be bona-fide the property of the exhibitor. 4. All manufacturers of agricultural implements have the privilege of exhibiting, and all implements must have been manu-

factured by the exhibitor in the present year. 5. No animals or articles exhibited shall have the owner's

name thereon, but known only by a number supplied by the Secre-6. Produce must be the growth of the current year and must

be grown by the exhibitor. 7. All cloth, yarn and ladies' work to be home-made and manufactured since last exhibition.

8. Each animal must be placed on the show grounds amongst those of its class. Bulls or rams must be secured by chain or rope. 9. Animals must have attached to them a number by which to designate them, and those under three years must have their ages

affixed to them so as to be readily seen by the judges. 10. Produce and manufactures must be delivered to persons appointed to take charge of the show room, or to be placed in their respective places, under their direction; the distinguishing number to be attached.

11. No article exhibited will be allowed to be removed from the show room until permitted by the directors in charge.

12. Competitors will not be entitled to more than one premium for same kind of grain, dairy produce, vegetables or agricultural implements.

13. All implements manufactured outside the township will be given space for exhibition, but no prizes awarded.

14. Competitors for prizes must give the Secretary notice of the description of stock or produce they intend to show between 8 and 10 a. m. of show day, and all stock, etc., to be on the grounds at same hour.

15. When an article or animal of any class is exhibited it will be discretionary with the judges whether the prize is awarded or not.

16. Entire horses are not allowed to be shown except as stallions. Team horses to be shown in wagon. Roadster stallions to be shown in rigs. No animal to compete for more than one prize.

17. Competition will be limited to the township of Egremont. 18. No persons are allowed to interrupt or go near the judges while discharging their duties.

19. Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation, ownership, or the entry of an article or animal in a class where it does not rightly belong, or any representation concerning any articles exhibited which may have effected, or may have intended to effect the decision of the judges, the Board shall have power to withhold the payment of any prize awarded and may prohibit any such party or parties exhibiting in any class for one or more years, and may publish the name of the

parties or not, as may be deemed most expedient. 20. In all cases of doubt or difficulty that may arise, before making their awards, the judges may submit the matter to one of the Directors, and the President and two or more Directors shall finally settle the same.

21, Prize money will be paid by the Secretary on or after the tenth of October.

22. Distinguishing badges-1st, Red; 2nd, Blue; 3rd, Green;

4th. White. 23. Members are requested to give the Secretary notice of the articles they intend to exhibit one week before show day, in order

to avoid confusion on that morning. No tickets given out after 10 o'clock a m. 24. The judges on arrival are requested to report themselves at

the office of the Secretary, where they will receive their badges and prize forms. Lunch will be provided for the judges at 10:30 o'clock a. m.


