Few industries were established with greater rapidity, and few industries have outgrown themselves in so short a time. It can't be over six months since ground was broken for the erection of the factory, which was thought to be of ample dimension for years to come, but business has sprung up so quickly that they are already crowded and will be forced to enlarge their premises at a very early date. The machines are giving great satisfaction wherever used.

VOTING on the By-law to ascertain the voice of the electors in regard to buying the flowing well is to come up shortly. What the electors will do is hard to say, but that the town should be supplied with good, pure, wholesome water no person will deny. The typhoid cases now in town is without a question the result of poor sanitation, and a visit from the Provincial health officers, and a mandate from the Government to discard some of the death traps must come in the very near future, and the sooner the better. We hope that a public meeting may be called for the purpose of discussing the question intelligently. Next week it is our intention to go more fully into the subject and let us hope that the electorate will show their wisdom by supporting the By-law.
