Flesherton.

The fourth annual convention of Artemesia Sabbath School Association was held in the Methodist church here on Wednesday of last week and was in point of program good but the attendance, especially at the afternoon session, was not what was expected. The Vice president, Rev. J. A. Matheson, of Priceville, presided and devotional exercises were led by Rev. L. W. Thom. of this place, after which Rev. G. F. Hurlburt, of this place, gave a thoughtful paper on "Teachers' Qualifications," some of which, said the speaker, are a thorough knowledge of the word of God and how to apply the word to the scholars. The successful teacher must know the truth experimentally and this implies that he must be in living touch with his Master. He should also understand human nature and if possible have a course of training in College, Bible or Normal class. Rev. W. F. Roach, of Priceville, followed with a very earnest and enthusiastic address on the Relation of Church and School. Mrs. W. H. Thurston, of this place, gave a concise paper on the "Sabbath School and Missions," which pointed out that in order that our young people be educated in missions it is imperative that the superintendent should have the work at heart and be an inspiration to his staff. The teacher should feel responsibility and see that his scholars are well taught in the missions of their own church although not confined to that. The reading of books on Missions and Missionaries stimulate and educate on that line. The nominating committee then reported, as did also the secretary, who stated that 15 schedules had been sent to the schools in the township but only 9 had reported all of which were on the whole encouraging, though only 3 reported as giving to missions. Four reported additions to the church, the total being 21. Average attendance fairly good, and two schools contributed \$1 each to the funds of the Association. The auditors reported the treasurer's accounts correctly kept and showing a balance on hand of \$3.50. The collection was then taken up, \$1.35. At the evening session Rev. Mr. Matheson again presided and Rev. W. A. Sinclair, of Eugenia, conducted devotional exercises, after which the report of the nominating committee was adopted and officers were elected as follows: Pres., Rev. G. F. Hurlburt, Flesherton; Vice-Pres., Mr. James Felstead, Flesherton; Sec'y, Rev. W. A. Sinclair, Eugenia; Treas., Mr. W. H. Bunt, Flesherton; Executive, the pastors and S. S. Superintendents in the township. Eugenia was chosen as next place of meeting. The newly elected president was then introduced and thanked the delegates for the honor conferred upon, after which thoughtful and stirring addresses were given by Rev. W. A. Rodwell, of Markdale, whose theme was Evangelistic work in Sabbath Schools, Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, this place, who spoke on "Parental responsibility," and Rev. J. A. Matheson, Priceville, whose subject was "Child life the battle ground of the Kingdom." Rev. L. W. Thom replied to those who sought information through the Question Drawer. The ladies here served refreshments in the school room of the church to the delegates who remained over from the afternoon session.
