AN interesting budget has just reached us from the House of Refuge at Markdale, but not in time for this issue which should have been off the press before now, Thursday morning. The racy writer is Mr. Fred Gee, a gentleman who has evidently seen better days. He tells us that paralysis forces him to use his left hand in writing and that he hasn't used a pen and ink for years. He is an old army man but we have forgotten the position he held and when and where he was engaged. He states his position in shorthand as newspaper correspondent, House of Refuge. Hope to hear from him frequently.

By the death of Mrs. Andrew Livingston on the 23rd of Dec., another of the old pioneers has passed away, death being due to a weak heart after a severe attack of la grippe. The deceased was born July 14th, 1830, in the County of York, where North Toronto now stands. About fifty years ago she came to Bentinck with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. McLaughlin, and settled on the old homestead near Allan Park, Durham Road. In the year 1832 she married her first husband, Mr. Christopher Mills, who died in 1871. The children of this union now living are Mr. W. D. Mills, Durham, and Mrs. Henry Muir, Hanover. Some years later she became the wife of Mr. Andrew Livingston, who predeceased her about five years ago. The children of this second marriage are, Thomas, of Durham, Frank A., of Onelph, and Herbert and May on the homestead. Owing to a weak heart Mrs. Livingston has for a number of years been almost an invalid. As a kind hearted, motherly woman she was unsurpassed. An example of this was the three families, consisting of 12 children, growing up together under her care and guidance to manhood and womanhood in peace and harmony. Among her old neighbors she was highly esteemed. The funeral took place Friday afternoon to the Durham cemetery, her six sons acting as pallbearers, Rev. Mr. Colling conducting the funeral service.

I. O. F. OYSTER SUPPER.

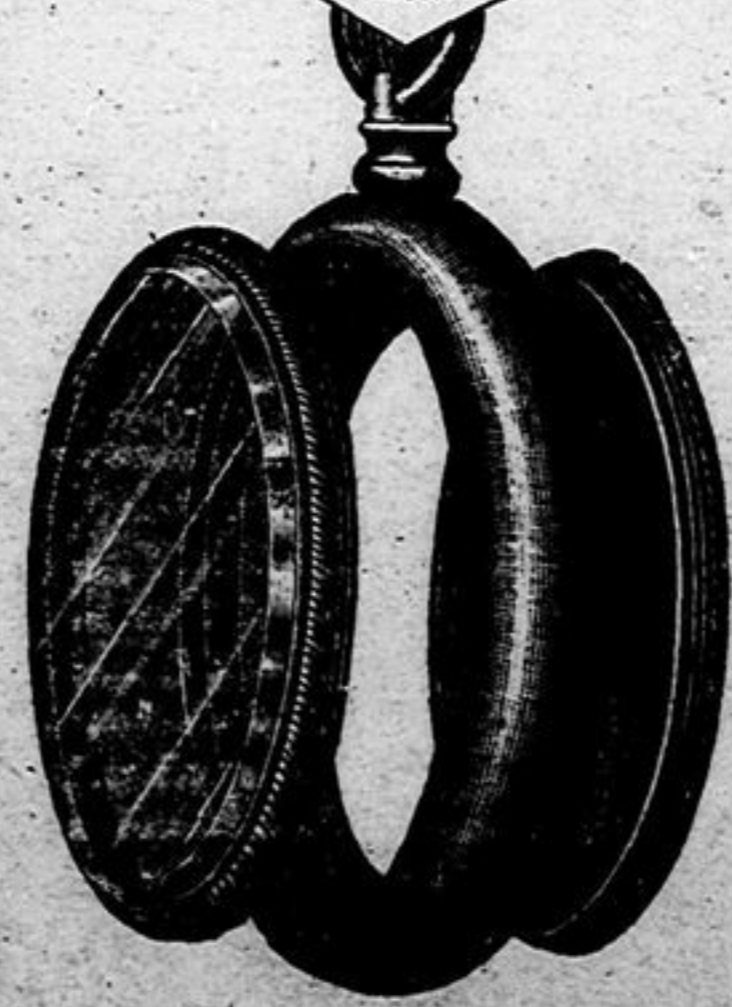
