Livingston Guelph, travelling representative of the Perin Plow Co., Wm. Livingston, farmer, of Bentinck, and Mrs. H. Richmond, Winnipeg. The funeral took place on the 28th (Friday) where the body was borne to the tomb in Sauguen Cemetery by her sons and step-sons. The services were conducted by the Rev. Colling, of Durham.
