## Flesherston.

The Presbyterian Sabbath School anniversary on Christmas evening was again very successful. After an excellent tea had been served in the school room of the church the auditorium was comfortably filled with an appreciative and orderly audience. The pastor conducted the program which had hardly a dull moment from beginning to end. The school showed careful training in the well rendered choruses and songs and the pleasing recitations and drills that were given. 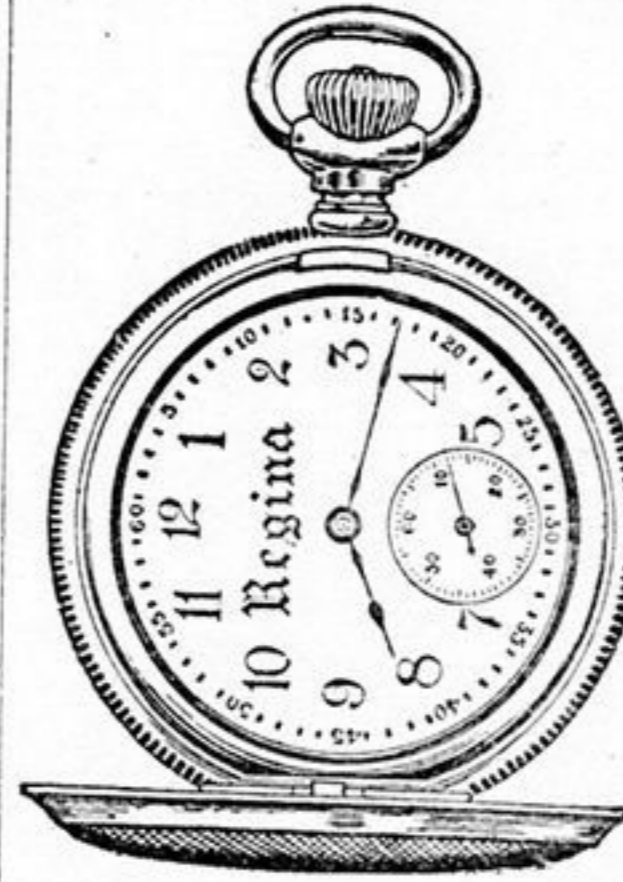
