GENERAL NEWS

The Manitoba Legislature was
opened on Thursday.

The St. John bank clearings for the
year ending December 31, 1906, total
\$60,624,760.

James H. Wylie, one of the oldest
citizens of Almonte, died on Thurs-
day, aged 82 years.

Mrs. W. B. Smith, the wife of the
deputy sheriff of Simcoe, died Thurs-
day at Barrie.

The new four-company regiment
at Woodstock has been authorized by
the Militia Department.

The report of the Insurance Com-
mission will be presented to Parliam-
ent about January 15.

Barrie's new Burton avenue Public
school was formerly opened Thursday
by Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Educa-
tion.

Brantford Trades and Labor Coun-
cil is considering a proposition of
publishing a labor paper to be issued
monthly.

The Medicine Hat, district shipped
in 1906 1,521 head of horses, 13,586
cattle, 12,171 sheep and 232,250
pounds of wool.

Rev. Francis Berry, a veteran Meth-
odist preacher is dead at St. Thomas
of pneumonia. He was born in To-
ronto 85 years ago.

Cobalt property that cost them
\$1,000 has been sold by Robert Jen-
kins, Arthur Greeling and Wm. Les-
ter, of Hamilton, for \$25,000.

Hamilton police Thursday night
arrested a man whom they believed
to be wanted in Buffalo on a charge
of murder, but found they had the
wrong man.

The customs collections for London
for the last six months total \$455,703-
04, an increase of \$16,422,56 over the
same period last year.

Superintendent Murphy, of the C.
P. R., transferred from Toronto to
London, arrived at his new headquar-
ters Thursday with a staff of clerks.

Jas. H. Snell, a well known farm-
er of East Oxford, was killed on
Wednesday by a blow on the back of
the head from a wagon tongue.

Mrs. E. Powell, of Banner, Ont.,
died on Monday leaving six children,
the eldest only being 12, orphans.
Their father died about three weeks
ago.

Vancouver Liberals have nominat-
ed W. W. B. McInnes, T. F. Neel-
lands, Judge Henderson, R. P. Mc
Lennan and J. W. B. Defarris for the
Legislature.

The resignations of Lieut. Col. G.
Peters, of the Toronto Light Horse,
and Major D. L. McCarthy, the next
in command, are in the hands of Gen-
eral Otter.

Count Gleichen, a cousin of King
Edward, attached to the British Em-
bassy at Washington, spent the holi-
day season at Ottawa with Earl and
Countess Grey.

Captain Bault and Mate Gillespie,
of the Golspie, are sought as witness-
es to give evidence at the inquest at
the Soo. They are believed to be in
Wiaraton.

A. J. Pattison, manager of the
Grand Valley Railway, denies that
the road between Brantford and Galt
and the Thames Valley road are to
be acquired by Pittsburg capital.

William Gordon, of Ottawa, form-
erly of the Marine Department and
private secretary to Sir Charles Tupper
and Sir Hibbert Tupper, died at
noon Thursday of Bright's disease.

Norman McArdle, of Hamilton,
while walking home on Wednesday
night, was shot in the knee by a man
who sprang at him out of an alley.
The assailant ran away before McAr-
dle could see him.

Mr. Napoleon Page, editor and
proprietor of the Spectateur, of Hull,
has been appointed by the Quebec
Government fish and game inspector
for the province, in succession to the
late Mr. N. E. Cormier, who died
over a year ago.

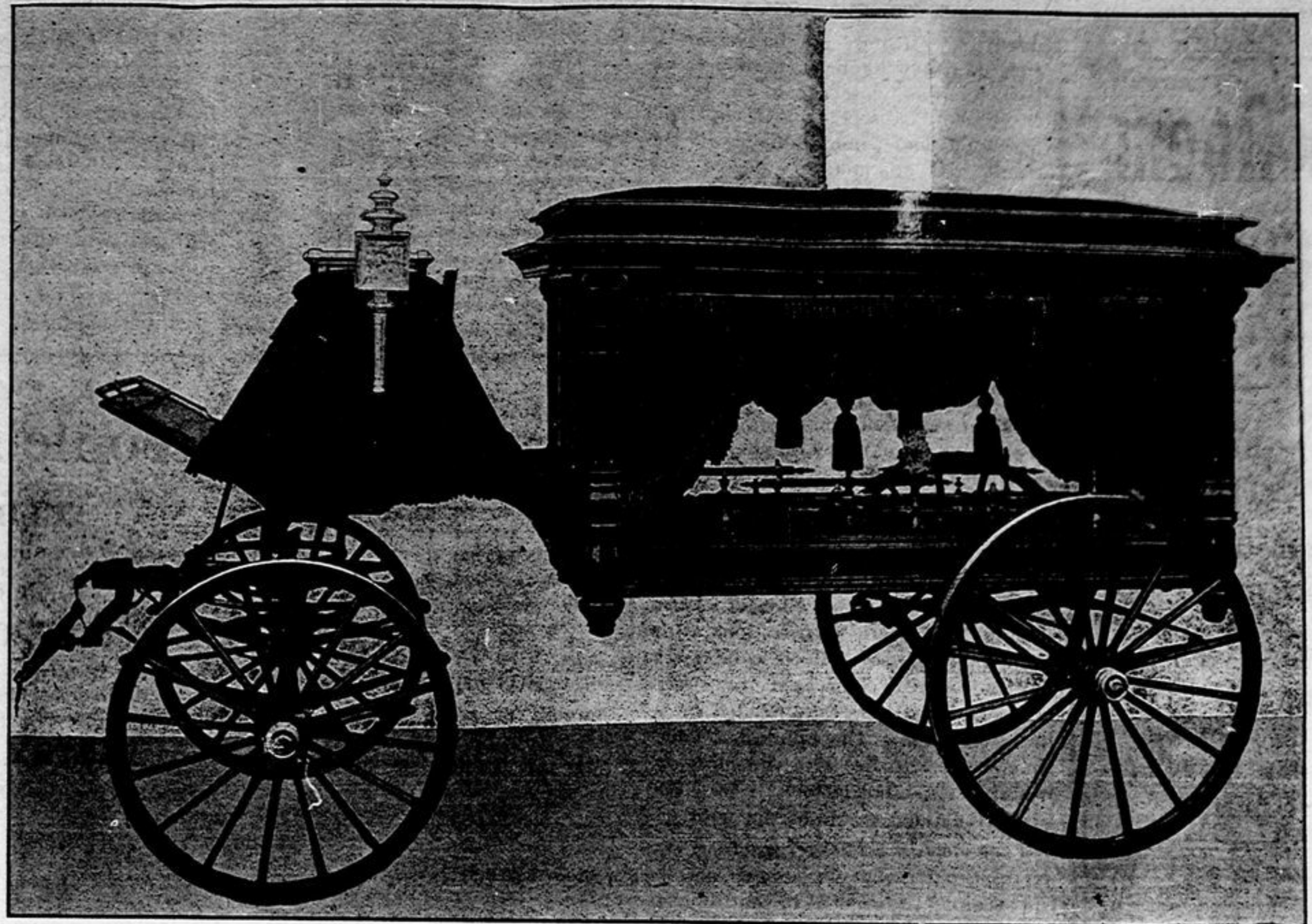
