Council met Dec. 15th. Minutes read.

Robb—McArthur—That minutes be amended by reading that S. Robb was paid \$3.50 for 230' tile and he paid into council \$4 for 420' tile.

Com'r Philip reported timber from C. Dezell for bridge lot 20, con. 6, \$24; R. Aitkens drawing timber and building bridge lot 20, con. 6, \$9.50, com. fees \$1; also inspected drain No. 140 rods, completed. To W. P. Ellis, contractor, \$60, fees \$1.25, adopted.

Com'r Ferguson gave a detailed report of work on hill lot 7, con. 20, by day's labor, amounting to \$11.93. Report adopted, com. fees and over-seeing \$13.—Carried.

Com'r McArthur reported a final settlement of water grievance between Messrs. Canton and Nicholson. Said parties signed an agreement. The sum of \$8 was paid.—Adopted.

Reeve reported expenditure at Dromore on response to a petition—Stoned 46 rods 8 ft. wide, 10 in. deep, graded and gravelled same by day's labor. Amount expended \$114. Adopted, com. fees \$1. Carried.

Com'r Robb reported—J. McDonald gravelling on E. and A. townline, \$2, Egt's share \$1; E. Robb drawing tile for 2 culverts Gardiner's sideline \$2; C. Evans repair culvert lot 6, con. 6, \$4.75.—Adopted. Also inspected work on drain No. 3, recommended payment of \$200 to J. Shea, contractor. Ins. fees \$3.—Adopted.

Mal. Campbell was paid \$5.25 for conveying J. R. Campbell to House of Refuge. Geo. Hargrave paid \$2.25 road improvements let in 1903 certified to by D. McIntyre.

Upon petition, Mrs. Kerr was refunded her land taxes amounting to \$2.90.

E. Hall was paid \$6 drawing tile and putting in culvert on E. and P. townline, Proton to pay 1/4 cost and \$2.50 for tile.

M. Bolger was paid \$5 for farm bridge as per engineer's award.

Jas. Russell was paid \$2 for burying a dead horse by order of D. McQueen, a member of Board of Health.

Com'r Robb recommended payment of \$10 to Mr. Hunter, gravelling account E. and A. townline (a grant).—Adopted.

The collectors were paid \$35 each, the clerk was paid \$5 for drainage By-law No. 2, the other three \$10 each. Jas. Myers was paid \$20, was expenses in removing Mrs. Christie to Hamilton Asylum.

Ferguson—McArthur—That the account of fees, Myers re Mrs. Christie, be laid over until reeve consults solicitor, and if advised to settle to issue an order accordingly.—Carried.

By-law No. 203 to appoint D. R. O. was passed. No charge.

Robb—McArthur—That Treas. be authorized to receive from Jas. Robertson the sum of 92c., being taxes in full against lot 19, Orchardville. Said taxes having been returned as not paid, and Co. Treasurer be notified of this action.—Carried.

Robb—Philip—That an order of \$110, part of commutal tax, be drawn in favor of P. V. trustees, and the following accounts be paid:—Alex. Stephen work on sidewalks, \$2.25; Mrs. Tanner, tile for do., \$2.15; John Rice overseeing, \$16.50; J. M. Dixon work, \$3.75; Geo. Klempp do., \$57.50; A. Durrant approaches to sidewalks, \$1.50; A. Ferguson—Philip—That a hearty vote of thanks be now tendered to the reeve for his able and courteous manner in which he has presided over the deliberations of the council during the past year.—Carried.

The reeve made a brief reply. The council rose.

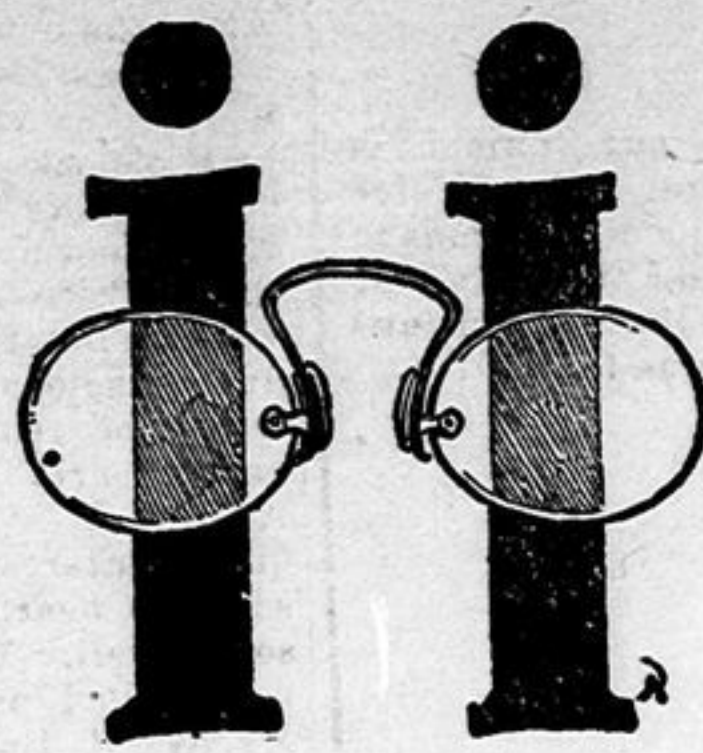

Ontario Department of Agriculture—Farmers' Institutes.

Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Dec. 28, 1906.

DEAR SIR,—No doubt the Farmers' Institute secretary for your riding will furnish you with posters and hand bills announcing meetings to be held in January, if he has not already done so. We sent you some weeks since a copy of Part II Farmers' Institute Report for 1906-07 are announced. I trust that you will do what can be done to insure the success of the meetings in your locality. Much can be done to increase the attendance by giving personal invitations to your friends and acquaintances to be present at the meetings and to be prepared to ask questions bearing upon the subjects for which the speakers are announced. The delegates have been instructed to make their addresses pointed and brief in order that some time may be devoted to discussions of local conditions and the applications of general principles. We trust also that the farmers in each locality will bring with them to the places of meeting, samples of grains, roots, fruit, which they have produced, as well as weed seeds. These can often be used by the delegates in illustrating their talks and these who come early to the meetings have an opportunity of examining them and carrying on informal discussions regarding the same before the regular sessions begin. Then again at the close of the session some may wish to tarry and examine the specimens more carefully. We have known of instances in which superior varieties of grain have been produced with success for two or three seasons in a locality, but the farmers in the vicinity were not aware that the variety was particularly adapted to the district or that seed could be secured. I am sure that an exhibition of seed, such as indicated above, and the interchange of opinions regarding the same would be of great benefit. We trust that you will co-operate with your secretary and, if possible, arrange to have live animals at the place of meeting in order that they may be used by the delegates in illustrating their lectures.

The speakers sent out this winter have had special opportunities in preparing themselves for the work in hand. They were nearly all at the four day conference held at Guelph, and we are confident that the information and suggestions received at that time will prove of great value to them in their work. There will be more uniformity of methods than in the past and the delegates are furnished with a greater quantity of illustrative material than in the past years.

You will be pleased to know that most of the meetings held during November and December were well attended and the interest manifested by those present was not marked, according to the reports of the delegates. The greatest success can attend the work of the Institute only when the directors and members generally take a personal interest in the meetings.

The delegates who will visit your riding in January are among our most experienced Institute workers, and I am sure that you will find in both Mr. Jones and Mr. Shearer men who are thoroughly in earnest and who will be of real value to the farmers in the district. I trust that you will give these men every assistance you can in making the meetings effective.

Copy of Resolution adopted by the Executive Committee of the Navy League Toronto Branch, 11th Dec. A. D. 1906.

"That it is not consistent with the true interests of Canada, either from a political or from an economic point of view, that we should continue to neglect all preparation to take our part in the Naval Defence of the British Empire, and that it is a duty we owe to ourselves, to our floating commerce, and to the Empire, that we should lay the foundations of a broad National Maritime Policy, in which Naval Preparation will go hand in hand with the development of a Canadian Mercantile Marine, with the encouragement of a Canadian shipbuilding industry, and with securing for Canada her fair share of the world's maritime transportation."
