Recently there occurred three deaths in three consecutive weeks at the institution, the last one occurring on the 24th of December when Donald Leitch aged 75 years, passed quietly and almost imperceptably away about 1:45 p m. Deceased, at his own request was discharged from the Institution in July last his term of committal having expired, but was re-admitted on the 13th of December looking very much the worse for his outing and it was prominently observable that his earthly career was rapidly drawing to a close. The remains were taken charge of by relatives and conveyed to Dornoch for interment on Wednesday.

Mrs. Allen, a well known personage in Owen Sound and vicinity, was admitted to the House on Saturday. the 22nd ult. The old lady does not seem to fully realize her position and is under the impression that she can go when and where she likes. We trust that she will bow with due submission to circumstances and without being troublesome.
