## GENERAL NEWS

Hamilton's fire losses for 1906 total \$215,615 29.

George McKeard, of McKeard & Dougherty, of Hamilton, is dead, aged 83.

Twenty-five people were killed on the I. C. R. during 1906. Some were suicides.

The natural increase in Peterboro's population for 1906 was 122, against 125 in 1905.

Vancouver bank clearings for 1906 totalled \$132,000,000, against \$80,000,000 for 1905.

Six million dollars' worth of agricultural implements were sold from Regina in 1906.

A scrutiny of the votes on the Mullock by-law in Guelph has been ordered by the Council.

At Ingersoll two auditors at a concert expropriated on the floor and were fined \$1 each.

Liberal nominees for the B. C. Legislature for Victoria are Messrs. Cruy, Cameron, McNiven and Hall.

Guelph Council have fixed the assessment on the Dodds' Cotton Spinning factory at \$5,000 for five years.

Collections in fines from Scott Act violators in the County of York, N. B., during the past year will amount to nearly \$1,000.

The Railway Commission has consented to the construction of a Canadian Northern Ontario bridge over the Wahnapiatae.

W. P. Archibald, Toronto, Dominion parole officer, was the guest of honor at the Canadian Club luncheon at Winnipeg Wednesday.

Norman Graham, of Rodney, was seriously injured while working on the Michigan Central block system at Victoria Wednesday.

The old man killed on the G. T. R. near Komoka on Sunday has been identified as William Hoes, of the Mount Hope Home, London.

Witnesses before the Grain Commission sitting at Moosomin swore that train crews held up shippers and accepted bribes to supply cars at \$10 each.

Mrs. Miller, operating the Columbia brewery at Cedar Grove, was fined \$75 and costs for selling beer in smaller quantities than the law allows.

The Intercolonial Railway is building three big motor cars in the Moncton shops for use on the line next summer.

Mrs. James Elliott, of Hamilton, was awarded \$1,200 damages by a jury in the Assizes there Wednesday for the death of her son, who fell from a scaffold in the Savoy theatre.

Wm. Brown, of London, was awarded \$500 damages by a jury in the Assizes there Wednesday for the loss of two fingers by his daughter Irene, aged 14, in Reif Bros' factory.

Isaac and Thomas Burgoyne, of West Cove, St. Margaret's Bay, set out to attend their lobster traps in Colman's Cove. The boat was found overturned. The bodies have not been recovered.

Mayor Coatsworth and the Toronto M. P.'s have been assured that an adjournment will be granted to permit Toronto to oppose the application of the railways to enter Toronto along the Beaches.

Mr. Laverne, M. P., Montmagny, has given notice of a resolution that the French Language be placed on an equal footing with English in all public matters, such as in the coinage and postal affairs.

Macdonald, McMillan & Co., railway contractors, are reported to have forfeited their 250 mile contract on the G. T. P. from Portage la Prairie to the Touchwood Hills. It is also reported that the firm has failed for a quarter of a million.

According to the report of Coroner McMahon, Montreal, five murders, twenty-three suicides, three homicides, and one case of manslaughter sum up the total of the more important verdicts of coroners' juries at the morgue during the past year.

Arthur Lemieux, of Papineauville, was drowned through the ice in the Ottawa River, opposite Rockland, Wednesday morning. He was being driven home across the river in a sleigh, when the sleigh went through. The five other occupants saved themselves.

Messrs. J. B. Milligan and B. F. Gaines, of Hanley, Sask., are in Winnipeg and deny that their town is experiencing a food and fuel famine. Adolphus Dean, farmer, of Smith township, aged 45, attempted to hang himself and was rescued by his wife just in time to save his life.

The Railway Commissioners will hold a session in Ottawa on Tuesday, Feb. 5, at 11 o'clock, to settle the form or forms of bills of lading and to discuss and decide upon a system of operating rules for the various railways subject to the jurisdiction of the board. The board will also consider at this meeting the petition of the railway trainmen of Ontario, dated the 28th day of April, 1906, and the representations of employes in relation thereto as made before the board on the 15th day of June, 1906.

Mrs. Hugh McPhail (Sarah McLean) who has been suffering with that dread disease—cancer—for many months passed away on the 2nd. The funeral on Friday last proceeded from the residence, South Line, Glenelg, to the Presbyterian church where the pastor, Rev. J. A. Matheson, officiated at the memorial services. Deceased was about 35 years of age, and survived her mother but a few weeks.

Mr. Archibald Muir, formerly living near Celon, but for a number of years has been in the far West, and whom we are sorry to learn lost his life in a railway accident during the last week of 1906, was laid to rest in the cemetery here on the 2nd inst., beside his father and mother. Deceased was about 50 years of age and unmarried. A very large number attended the funeral, Rev. J. A. Matheson officiating.

### OBITUARY.

ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

The late Archibald Campbell, who passed to his rest on Wednesday, January 2nd, after suffering for some time with dropsy, was perhaps one of the best known pioneers in this district. Born in 1836 in the Isle of Illa, Scotland he came to this country at the age of ten and settled in the Chinguacousy Twp., near Brampton, with his parents, seven brothers and two sisters, two of whom, Mr. Malcolm Campbell and Mrs. Douglas Paul, are living on the 6th line of Collingwood.

Before coming to Heathcote the deceased taught school for some time in Nottawasaga township, and afterwards at Heathcote, 10th line and 7th line school house. In 1867 he married Miss Mary Ann Spaul, six children resulting from this union. Two daughters, Miss Sarah at home, Mrs. Jas. Fawcett, of the 10th line, and his widow survive him.

Mr. Campbell had many years experience in municipal matters, being first elected to the council of Collingwood township in 1880 as 1st deputy reeve to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late William White. He held this office until 1887 and was then out of municipal life until 1892, when he successfully contested the township for the reeveship, holding this responsible position which he filled with credit to himself until 1901. In 1900 he moved from his farm on the 10th line to Thornbury and since then has lived a quiet retired life, highly respected and esteemed by all who knew him.

Manitoba's municipalities have stimulated the cause of government ownership of public utilities not only in Canada, but in the United States. Winnipeg and her neighboring cities have voted favorably upon the Provincial ownership of all long-distance telephone lines and the municipal control of all local wires. The voice of those wise people can not fail to carry hope and inspiration to other North American States and Provinces that are victimized by the telephonic octopus. Manitoba has placed herself in the forefront of progressive communities, and economists and legislators alike will look eagerly yet with patience to the outcome of this taking-over. Conservatives and those affiliated with or interested in other public utility enterprises will frown upon this expansion of governmental control, and will hasten to advertise and magnify every flaw and failure in the public service. But a people who set the economic destinies of our times as clearly as do these progressive Manitobans will not be misled by either a false conservatism or a false enthusiasm. Almost every city on the continent is ready to do what the Manitoba municipalities have done. Many will look to Manitoba to find out how!

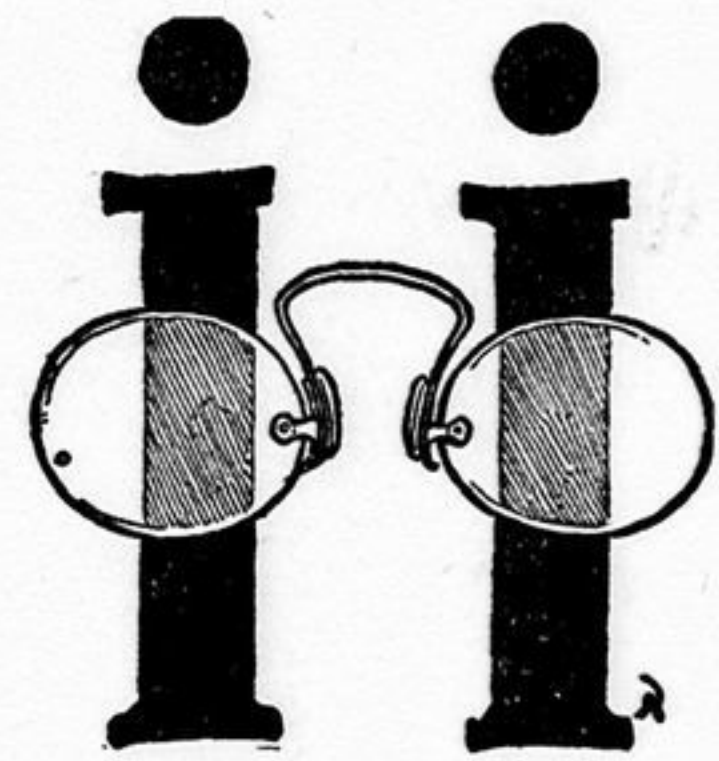
