The Dandelion.
A good time to exterminate the dandelion is in the autumn. It cannot be done by digging up the plant, for it is impossible to extract all of the root, and later on twice as many plants will spring up. The best way is to pour gasoline all around and into the center of the plant, and in a few days it will shrivel up and die.

Light and the Eyes.
The effect of artificial light on the pigment of the iris is to make it paler; also prolonged eye work will do this. Eyes never become quite blanched, like the hair, but they do fade, and very appreciably.

The Greenfinch.
Among the cutest of English wild birds are greenfinches, which frequent old buildings and old walls for the sake of freshly caught insects and spiders in cobwebs, personal exertion being thereby saved. They are well aware of stores in the larders of spiders' webs.

It is said that a London lawyer once gave as a dowry to his daughter, who married a young barrister, his briefs and interest in a chancery suit which he himself had inherited from his father.

The First Blankets.
In the reign of Edward III. there were at Bristol three brothers who were eminent clothiers and woolen weavers and whose family name was Blanket. They were the first persons who manufactured that comfortable material which has ever since been called by their name and which was then used for peasants' clothing.

Sugar Mills.
The machinery of the modern sugar mill is so complete that from the time the cane enters the crushing rolls until the same is emptied from the vacuum pans no human labor is required to manipulate it.

Butterflies.
Butterflies are considered nutritious and delicious food by the aborigines of Australia.

Eye Color.
The gray eye is an almost universal characteristic of people of great intellect. Black eyes indicate an ardent temper, while light blue eyes, which are found chiefly among the Scandinavians, denote a cheerful disposition and a constant nature.

Unique Sundial.
In the grounds adjacent to Wentworth castle, in England, is to be seen a unique sundial which is composed of a fine yew tree for the pin and closely cropped box bushes for the Roman figures and borderings. It was planted over 200 years ago and is still in a good state of preservation. Its time-keeping compares favorably with sundials of more modern construction.

Baldness.

Bridge Designer's Curious Wish.
Henley bridge, in England, was designed about 1786 by Thomas Hayward, who expressed the wish that he might die ere the work was commenced and that his body might be interred under the center pier. He died before the bridge was completed, but was buried in the churchyard close by.

Day and Night.
By a simple rule the length of the day and night at any time of the year may be ascertained. By doubling the time of the sun's rising the length of the night is obtained, and by doubling the time of the setting the length of the day is given.

Coldest European Capital.
St. Petersburg is the coldest capital in Europe, the temperature in winter sometimes reaching 50 degrees below zero.

Expectation of Life.
According to the English table of expectation of life, out of 1,000,000 children born the survivors at the age of sixty would be 182,350 males and 187,477 females, of whom ten years later there would be 114,370 males and 123,607 females, or a total of 237,977.

Trees in Sicily.
The ancient poets used to sing of the dense forests of Sicily. Today the mountains are bare. The question of reforestation is a difficult one. Attempts at starting new growth are frustrated by the peasants, who tear down fences and drive in their goats. Only under military protection could new forest trees be grown.
