EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met January 14th. Members elect subscribed to the required declarations and took their seat as follows:—Walter Hastie, Reeve; Walter Ferguson, Deputy Reeve; John McArthur, John R. Philip and Geo. Lothian, Councillors. Minutes approved. By-law No 204 for the appointment of Auditors passed the usual readings, &c. The names of John Ross and John A. Swanston were inserted in By-law. Salary \$10 each.

By-law No. 205, for appointing a member of the Board of Health and a Medical Health Officer, was passed. The name of W. J. Wilson, Sr., was inserted in By-law and that of Dr. Sneath as M. H. Officer. The Board of Health for 1907 are the following: W. J. Wilson, Sr., R. G. McEachern and Donald McQueen, together with the reeve and clerk and Dr. Sneath M. H. Officer.

By-law No 206, to issue debentures for trustees of S. S. No. 7, amounting to \$2500 00. The preliminary steps required by the trustees were fully complied with. The By-law was passed and executed in duplicate and instructions given for registration and notice thereof to be given according to the Public School Act.

Philip—Ferguson—That the reeve be appointed to effect a settlement re road expenditure on A. and P. townlines.—Carried.

McArthur—Lothian—That we make a grant of \$5 to the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto.—Carried.

Philip—McArthur—That W. Ferguson examine validity of treasurer's sureties in Registry office and report at next meeting.—Carried.

The reeve reported the result of his consultation with T. P. Solicitor re Myer's Bill presented in Decr. meeting. Mr. Kingston advises us not to pay the same, as we are in no way liable therefor.

Philip—Lothian—That the reeve's report be adopted and he receive \$2 for his services.—Carried.

McArthur—Lothian—That Com'r Philip be appointed inspector of drain No. 4.—Carried.

Ex-councillor Robb reported that in conjunction with reeve of Arthur and Com'r Brown, of Wellington Co. they let a contract of graveling on the A. and Eg't townline to R. Hunter, 80 yds. at 90c per yd., anywhere between Conn and the 2nd con. Arthur, also 100 yds. at 75c per yds. between the 2nd and 4th con. Arthur. 60 yards of this contract has been completed and the following amounts have been paid thereon:—Egremont \$10, Arthur \$13, Wellington Co. \$27, and Mr. Robb has received from Ar. \$1.55 to pay Mr. Cooper Egerton for gravel, and would recommend said contract to be continued.

McArthur—Ferguson—That said report be adopted and he receive \$4 for his services, Eg't to pay half.—Carried.

Mr. Robb also adopted that since last meeting of council he had paid \$22 on contract of drain No. 3, making a total of \$622 paid on said drain. Report adopted and \$1 fees be paid.—Carried

Resolved that the following accounts be paid:—W. J. Sharp use of hall nomination, \$3; Municipal World election supplies, \$13.81; Clerk distributing ballots, \$4; O. M. Seim financial statements and ballots, \$19.25; Deputy Returning Officers, \$56.50; W. S. Sutton express charges, 50c.; Clerk's registration of births, marriages and deaths, \$26.40; W. Aljoe gravel, \$10; Chas. Kears repairs to grader, \$7.

James Myers refunded \$2 55 re Mrs. Christie's account. Adjourned to meet Feb 9th to receive Auditors' Report, applications for assessor and collectors, and to appoint pathmasters, and general business.

Last week some information was given in these columns on the subject of wolves in reply to an article in a New York magazine wherein the impression was conveyed that Canada was over run with wolves, and that anybody in quest of sport should come over here, put on snow-shoes, and bag a pack or two. Of course this country is not over-run with wolves, and a man has to make a long journey into the north country to get a chance to have a shot at one of these animals. In my zeal to defend home and native land I said last week that the only wolf story that had come to hand for some time was from Batoche, Sask., where a half-breed had been forced to climb a tree and remain there all night. Next day, in turning over the pages of Rod and Gun in Canada, there stood out before me the picture of a big timber wolf, with the announcement of an organized wolf hunt in Ontario and Quebec. Next day a despatch from Winnipeg told of some boys seeing a big wolf on the main street of that city, which they chased across the river. They also got after a lynx, which they clubbed with sticks. The day following a letter came to hand from Mr. S. E. Sangster, of Ottawa, who edits the Canadian department in the National Sportsman, assuring me that without doubt wolves are on the increase in both Ontario and Quebec. He says they are "increasing rapidly; they seem to increase in numbers in proportion as the deer and other game increase. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company are cognizant of the fact and, as a result, have been organizing a series of wolf hunts with the scene of operations in northern Quebec and Ontario. Under Mr. L. O. Armstrong's direction a party of about one hundred men leave for northern Quebec on Jan. 21, and on Feb 9 a second hunt commences north of Desbarats's, in northern Ontario. Any of the Hudson Bay Company's men in these districts will back me in stating that wolves are rapidly increasing. The Legislature of Quebec last year, because of this fact, raised the bounty to \$15 (the same as in Ontario), simply because the question was getting too important to leave untouched." So it goes. When you start to brag in defence of your country, your country goes back on you.

The figures given last week showing the total amounts paid in Ontario by way of bounty on wolves' ears, would indicate an increase in wolves. In 1900 the bounties paid amounted to \$1,017, and in 1906 to \$8,082. But it is suspected that some of this money should have been paid by Michigan. However, let us not blink the fact that wolves are on the increase in the North, that the opening of new railway lines through hitherto unvisited regions, brings the wolves into evidence and sets them ranging in new directions, and the safety of the game requires that they be thinned out. Still, Canada is a big country, and the wolf hunting grounds are away in the unfrequented North.—Toronto Saturday Night;
