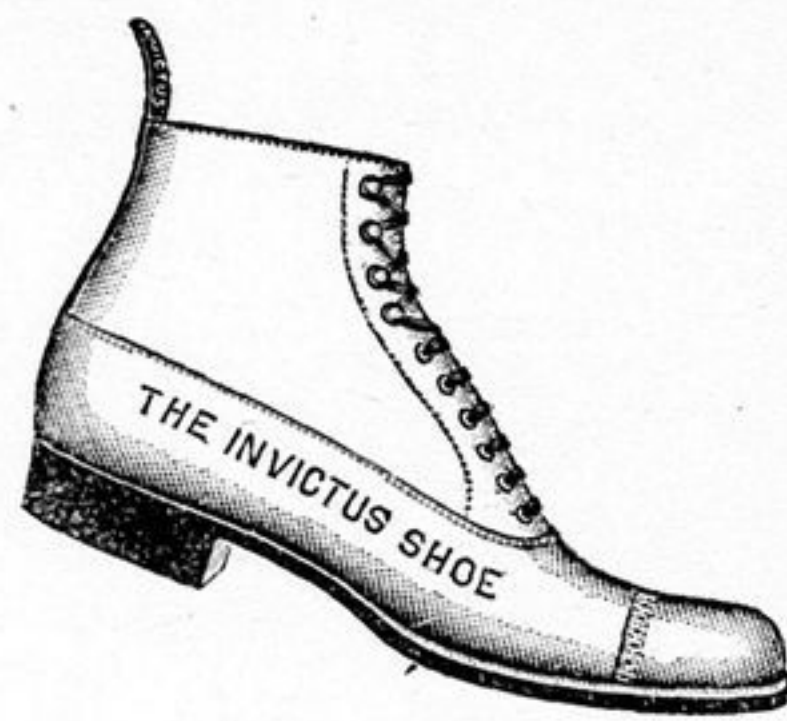

Artemesia Township Council held their meeting for this month on Saturday last when the auditors' report on the accounts of 1906 was presented the abstract of which was as follows: Cash on hand Jan 1st, 1907, \$2641.80; taxes, \$17183.77; fines, \$5.00; debentures, \$3872.17; loans, \$2000.00; Miscellaneous, \$1151.25; Police Trustees, \$2.55; total receipts, \$26859.54. Expenditure: Salaries, etc., \$1125.11; Stationery and printing, \$186.78; law costs, \$15.00; roads and bridges, \$2035.17; carriages, \$47.06; county rate, \$2489.86; Schools, \$8602.80; Board of Health, \$427.81; debentures and coupons, \$4393.05; loans, \$2033.15; sinking fund, \$318.48; miscellaneous, \$342.44; Flesherton police trustees, \$817.42; balance on hand \$4025.41; total, \$26859.54. The assets of the township were \$7898.91 and the liabilities principally school debentures \$9488.03. The township's finances are shown to be in a healthy condition.

McKenzie, gave an excellent report of the Convention held at Guelph in December last and was given a hearty vote of thanks for the same.
