

CLASSIC CITY CHRONICLES.

On Tuesday evening last week the citizens of Stratford were favored with an exceedingly bright, interesting and descriptive lecture entitled "A Woman's Way Through Labrador" by Mrs. Leonidas Hubbard. It is hard to believe that a woman could gather the courage and strength to undertake such a perilous journey through such a rough, rugged and unexplored country as eastern Labrador, but that is just what the lecturer did when she made that now famous canoe trip from Hamilton's inlet to the mouth of the George River at Ungava Bay, a distance of over 600 miles in 66 days. Another half-breed, an Indian and an Esquimaux completed her party and with these men Mrs. Hubbard made a trip that for adventure and excitement exceeds anything we have ever read of in the line of exploration by a woman. The lecture was splendidly illustrated by a large number of views of typical scenes on the route. The lecture was given under the auspices of the Y. W. C. A. who were no doubt gratified by the large audience that turned out to hear Mrs. Hubbard.

Experiments With Farm Crops.

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1907 they are prepared to distribute into every Township of Ontario material for experiments with fodder crops, roots, grains, grasses clovers, and fertilizers. About 2,000 varieties of farm crops have been tested in the Experimental Department of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for at least five years in succession. These consist of varieties from nearly all parts of the world, some of which have done exceedingly well in the carefully conducted experiments at the College and are now being distributed free of charge for co-operative experiments throughout Ontario. The following is the list of co-operative experiments in agriculture for 1907.

Table with 3 columns: No., EXPERIMENTS, PLOTS. Lists various crop varieties and their plot numbers.

The size of each plot of the first twenty seven experiments and in Nos. 29 and 30 is to be two rods long by one rod wide; and in No. 28, one rod square.

Each person in Ontario who wishes to join in the work may choose any one of the experiments for 1907, and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received until the supply is exhausted. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice, for fear the first could not be granted. All material will be furnished entirely free of charge to each applicant, and the produce will, of course, become the property of the person who conducts the experiment.
