THE CROW'S BRIEF VISIT TO QUEBEC.

DEAR EDITOR.—Having seen my letter regarding my visit to Montreal in the columns of The Chronicle last week and having promised to say something about Quebec later on, I now do so. I must not take up too much of your space by describing every thing I saw, as it can be devoted to something else of more value. In the first place allow me to say Quebec is the most historical city in Canada, and indeed is well worthy of a visit. The first thing on entering the city that the stranger will observe is the very narrow streets and the next thing to take his attention is the ancient looking buildings that meet the gaze on all sides. But all the buildings are not of the old type, not by any means. Modern structures are rising on all sides and some of them are the most beautiful that can be seen anywhere. Among the most important and interesting places seen were the Chateau Frontenac, one of the most magnificent hotels on the American continent built by the C. P. R. at the cost of about a million dollars. It is situated on Dufferin Terrace and commands one of the most picturesque views of the city, harbor and Point Levis. Crossing Dufferin Terrace we see the Champlain monument, a beautiful statue erected to the memory of the founder of Quebec. We next come to the monument of Generals Wolfe and Montcalm, a very interesting feature in connection with this beautiful monument is that it is commemorative of both victor and vanquished. The Parliament buildings are magnificent and the City Hall is also an elegant building, then again surpassing in grandeur either of the last named is the Basilica, or French Cathedral, which my friend Mr. F. Hutchings took me through. The inside of this Church is just beautiful and lined throughout with the most costly and artistic decorations. Another quaint and beautiful building is the English Cathedral inside of which is a gold communion service presented by George the III; the Post Office is also a very fine structure and all inside is life and activity. Then there is the Holt, Renfrew & Co., Farriers, a large building which is very fine. The Y. M. C. A. Bldg is also worthy of passing mention. I also had the pleasure of seeing the old time residence of Queen Victoria's father, then Duke of Kent, which is now used as a curiosity shop. Another place of historical interest was the house wherein the great French General, Montcalm, passed away in the year 1759. I had the privilege of being in the room where the last scenes in connection with his death took place.

A very noticeable feature is that Upper Town built on the cliff has more modern buildings and wider streets than are to be seen in Lower Town. Elevators are in operation in the summer time to carry people into the upper part of the city, but these do not run in the winter time, therefore my friend and I passed through lower town market place and walked up what are known as the break neck steps.

All along the line of the C. P. R. from Montreal to Quebec, the most beautiful scenery is presented to view. The Laurientian mountains look grand as the trains rush along, and also a fine view of them can be obtained from Dufferin Terrace.

Taking a birds-eye-view of Quebec it is a beautiful city surrounded by massive walls, towers, parapets, gates and so on. Mounted on top of those walls are the numerous cannons which guard every point of entrance into the city.

Well, there were many other places I had the pleasure of seeing but I did not adopt the method of taking notes I had to trust to memory for what I have already written. Although my stay in Quebec was not a very long one, I thoroughly enjoyed my brief visit to that dear old city and pleasant memories connected with that trip, will long be cherished.
