BUY NO COAL, BURN ASHES.

Cobbler's Great Discovery.

Altoona, Pa., March 23.—John Ellmore, a cobbler, of this city, holds a discovery that seems to presage a revolution in the coal-bill industry.

At the plant of the Citizens' Electric Company he yesterday was allotted one of the ten boilers, and with three bushels of ashes he produced more heat than was obtained from the other nine.

Ellmore is carefully guarding his secret, and has applied for patent rights. His process is very simple. He takes ten parts of ashes to one part of coal, and over this sprinkles a small quantity of a compound which causes the combustion.

When he opened the doors of the boiler in which his compound was burning yesterday, spectators gazed upon a fire that glowed brilliantly and had a bluish tinge. A lump of coal surrounded by ashes glowed like a bed of burning anthracite.
