We record with sorrow the death of an old and highly respected resident of this village in the person of Mr. John Calvert whose death occurred last Wednesday morning, March the 27th, at his residence after an illness due to heart trouble. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place Saturday afternoon at two o'clock to Maplewood Cemetery.

Mr. Calvert was one of the pioneers of Orchardville; he was born in Ecclefechan, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, November 16th, 1832. Mr. Calvert and his young wife moved to Orchardville shortly after their marriage and resided here until their death.

They reared a large family of four sons and two daughters, James, deceased, Mrs. E. J. Hartford, of Durham, John, of Orchardville, Frank, merchant, of Brandon, Samuel, of Treherne man, and Miss Mary, at home. Mr. Calvert has two sisters and two brothers who survive him. The family being one of the most highly respected in this section have the sympathy of the whole community in their sad bereavement.

OBITUARY.

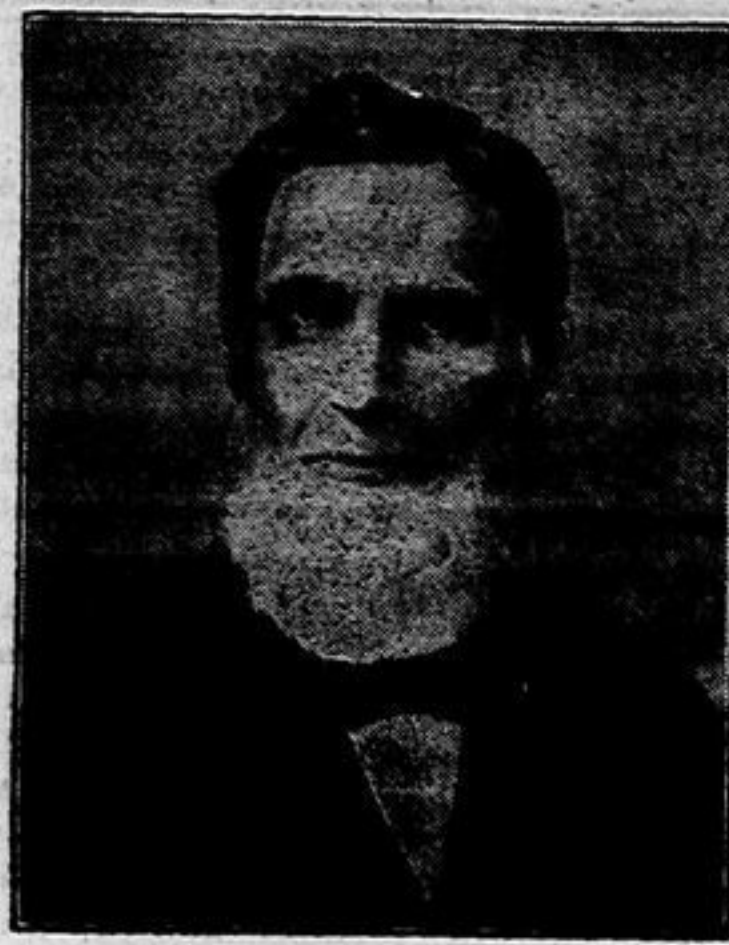

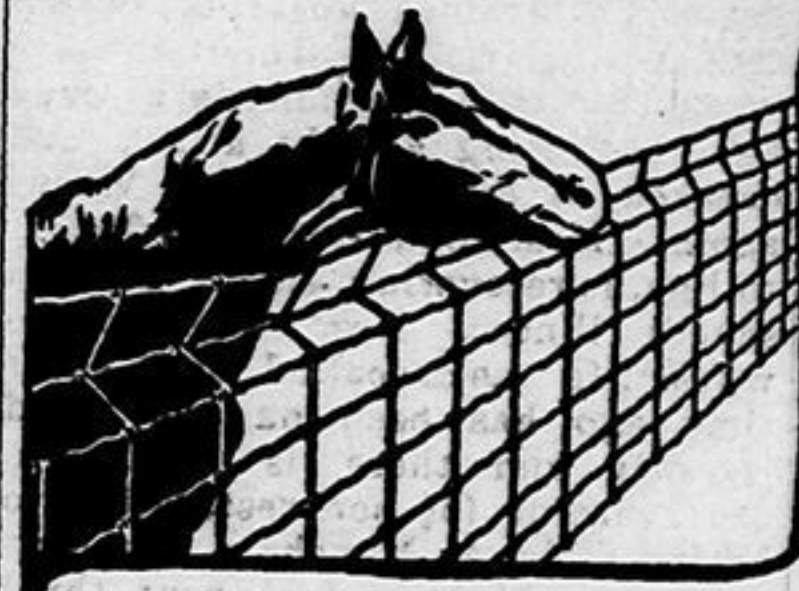

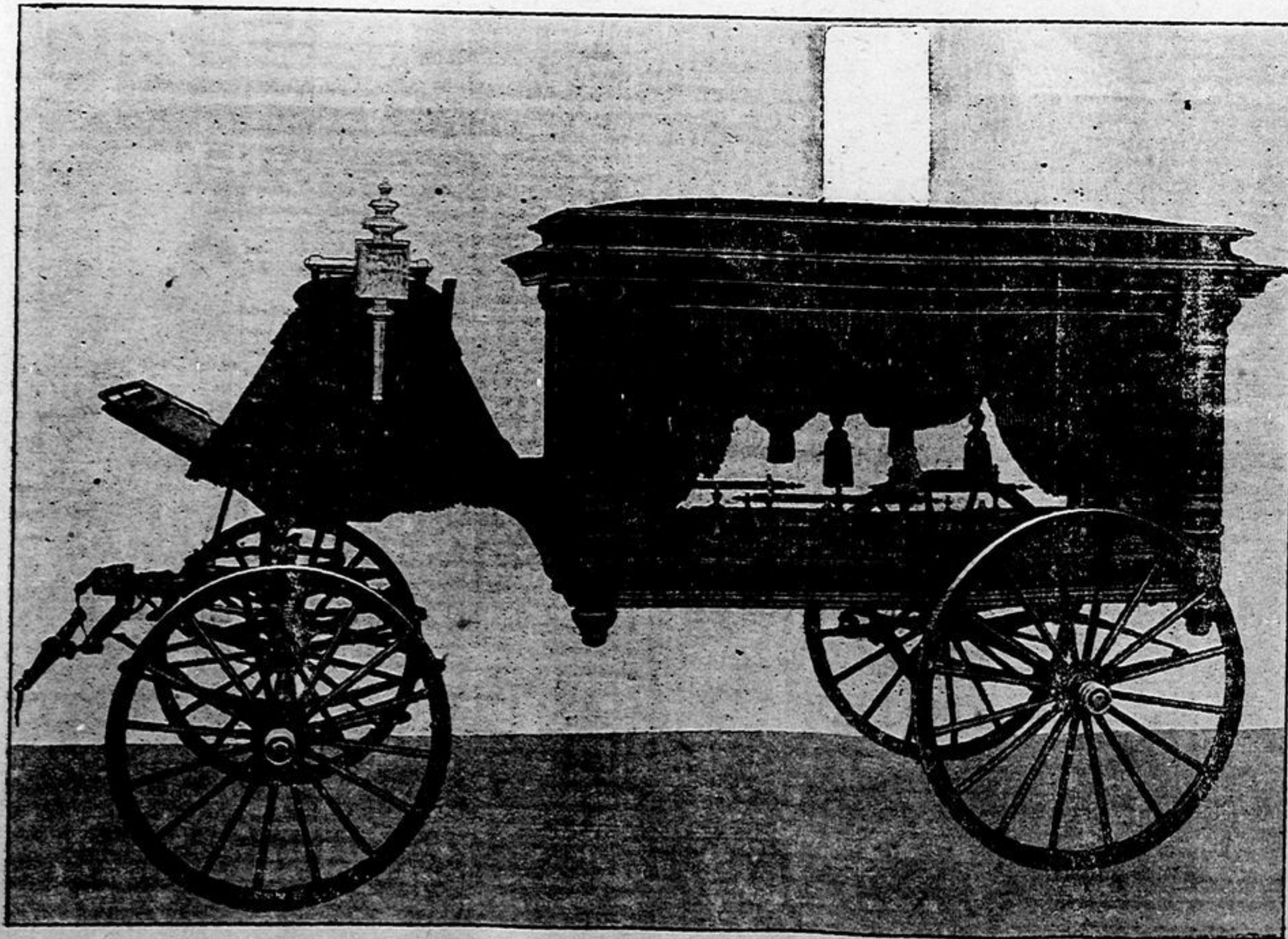
