SPARE THE TREES.

(Farmer's Advocate)

It will pay every farmer to use his influence in the direction of sparing the trees growing on or beside the public highways, particularly trees on roads running through our more thickly settled rural districts. In Ontario we are accustomed to read about blizzards, but as a rule, we are not familiar with them through suffering from or witnessing their ravages. However, as the few remaining trees of our small forests are falling, the custom is growing of the felling of the few trees found growing along our highways and in our more inaccessible ravines. The result will be that our farms will become more and more exposed to the ravages of the deadly cyclone. Some farmers urge that the trees shelter the portion of the field lying along the roadside, to the loss of their crops. No doubt this is the case in many instances. At the same time the trees repay for the loss in crops by providing homes for useful birds and by giving shelter to cattle, to say nothing of the good they do by relieving the countryside of monotony and giving the landscape a beauty and an interest to be had from no other source. Besides there are large sections of our country, such as many of our hillsides and ravines, that will not be available for agricultural purposes for many a day, but which might well be devoted to forest purposes. The man who guards his young trees will be blessed by his children and his grandchildren, and will be doing not a little to save his native land from the ravages of the tempest. School-children should be reminded of the value of trees, and educated to appreciate their beauty. Our native sugar maple served our fathers in many an hour of need, both on the fire-place and on the table, and it may be that its spreading branches and sturdy trunk may yet be our bulwark against those dreadful hurricanes that sweep away in a moment the careful bandry of years. Let township councils and all public leaders appeal to the intelligence of all with whom they come in contact, in order that our beautiful trees may be spared.

A Serious Charge

(Owen Sound Times.)

Tuesday night's C. P. R. train brought from Flesherton a prisoner charged with a most serious crime. The evidence implicates two professional men in a questionable transaction which they will be exceedingly fortunate if they can disprove. Last summer, Dr. Park, of Feversham, Osprey township, while attending the family of W. Patterson, who reside in the adjoining township of Collingwood, had his suspicions directed to the condition of the thirteen-year old daughter of the house, whose mind is somewhat unbalanced. Direct questioning elicited a confession that for two years the girl had maintained illicit relations with Hugh Thompson, a farmer whose farm adjoins that of the Patterson's home. Shortly after the girl's parents and other members of the family were taken by Dr. Park to the office of John Bernie, K. C., town solicitor of the town of Collingwood, and depositions were made. The latter wrote to Thompson who appeared next morning early at Mr. Bernie's office, where it is alleged in evidence at the preliminary trial that he made a settlement for \$800, paying \$600 in cash and giving a mortgage on his farm for the balance. It is here that the matter reached the attention of the authorities. Dr. Park, hearing that the Patterson's had received nothing of the amount interviewed A. S. VanDusen, J. P., at Flesherton, who in turn referred the matter to County Crown Attorney Armstrong. The latter instructed Mr. M. K. Richardson, Ex-M. P., the special agent of the Children's Aid Society to look into the matter and as a result of the information the Attorney General's department was communicated with and Provincial Detective Greer was sent up to make a thorough investigation. On Saturday last he was in Owen Sound and consulted Mr. Armstrong, and warrants were issued for Thompson's arrest. Monday he served Mr. Bernie and Dr. Park with subpoenas as witnesses and on Tuesday the preliminary hearing took place before Magistrate VanDusen. The evidence was of such a conclusive nature that there was no hesitancy in a commitment for trial. It is alleged that \$200 of the amount paid by Thompson was handed over to Dr. Park, which together with \$160 already paid was for professional services. The balance it is claimed Mr. Bernie retained. Mr. Bernie's explanation is that he heard that the crown were about to take the matter up and he thought it best not to pay the money over. Thompson denies having paid the money. The Pattersons are a most illiterate class and live an squalor and dirt. Only the father is able to read, the depositions being signed by marks of the others. Thompson gave his age as fifty-nine when registered at the gaol and is married. Mr. W. H. Wright appeared for Thompson at the preliminary hearing.

AN AVALANCHE OF FIRE

Amongst the most awe inspiring spectacles ever witnessed upon this earth a great forest or heath fire takes a foremost place. Originating perhaps from a carelessly thrown lighted match, a strong wind fans the flame, and in an incredibly short space of time a broad stretch of heath is blazing furiously. Ever broadening out, the conflagration is a very deluge of fire, curling billows of wild fire savagely leaping and bounding onwards; now as a wide breadth of gorge is reached, with a fierce roar and livid flames mounting high in air, forked, blood red tongues of palpitating fire quivering and vibrating half concealed amidst the rolling gyrating wreaths of blinding smoke; now as a clump of tall firs is gripped by the devouring torrent, a very inferno, a whirlwind of eddying flames, surging madly in a frenzied spasm of lurid rage with a hoarse stridor as though it were the blast of a wild, infuriate hurricane; and now, the gale moderating, stealing along with diminished fury, though still a hissing sea of tossing fiery rollers; until at length the destroying blast subsides, the convulsive roar is stilled, and the wild raging orgasm is quelled.

But what a terrible metamorphosis! Where once was a smiling landscape is now but a black ruin, a ravaged devastated wilderness. Where once all was gay in floral beauty, tufts of bell-heather all aglow in a brilliant pink, tassels and garlands of traveller's joy hanging in luxuriant profusion from the boughs of a tall thorn or hazel, erect spikes of purple foxglove or pendant drapes of the graceful bitter-sweet, all now are swept away or reduced to ashes, and in their place is but a desolate waste.

Where once the lark carolled forth his love-song on high, or the yellow-hammer warbled its harmonious chaunt, or the blackcap trilled out its melodious strophes, all is now silent as the grave; not a songster of the wood ventures near that charred and gruesome desolation, nor enlivens its dismal melancholy with its tuneful harmony; not a squirrel will caper on those lifeless, blackened trees; not an animal will gambol on that stricken waste. For now the blithesome scene is but a dreary lugubrious wreck, the gay, flowery prospect a lifeless, withered ruin.

And we too, if the taint of sin, inherited or committed, is washed away and blotted out from the record through faith in the atonement made for us by the Saviour of the world, then is our lot in this life an existence enlivened with buoyant, exultant joys; and in the life to come, an inheritance of ecstatic gladness and of ravishing enchantments. But if we forget our Creator and reject His plan of salvation, then the fires of retribution pass over us; our heart becomes but a seared and aching void, and the world to come but a dread vision of blackness and ruin.
