Pathetic Funeral of Little Victims of Montreal School Fire.

Montreal, May 19.—A pathetic scene was witnessed in Mount Royal Cemetery yesterday afternoon, when the bodies of the children who lost their lives in the Hochelaga school fire on Feb. 22nd, were laid in their graves.

The bodies of sixteen children and that of their heroic teacher, Miss Sarah Maxwell, were laid side by side in a plot, which was specially assigned for them by the cemetery authorities. The many persons gathered at the graves, many of them being little pupils of the ill-fated school. There were many pitiable scenes, as the bereaved mothers or sisters saw the little coffins conveyed from the vaults and lowered into the grave.

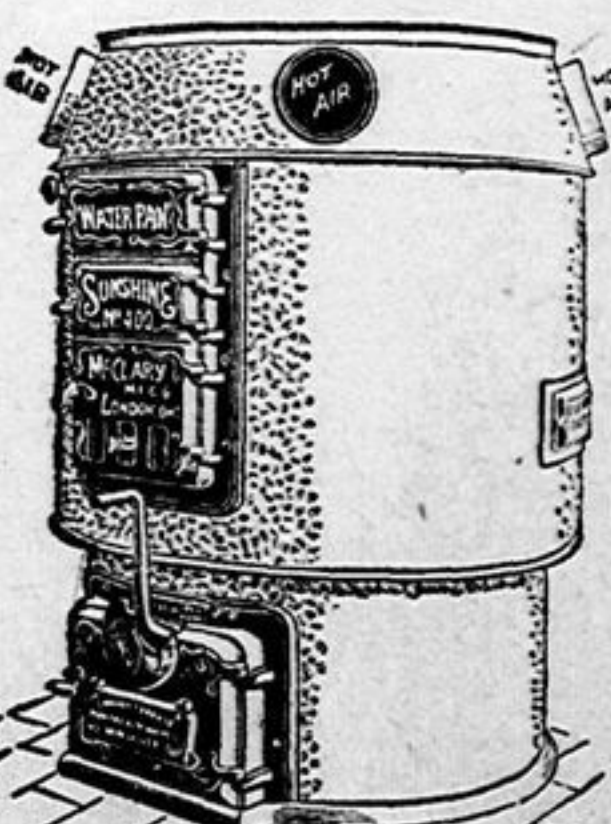
