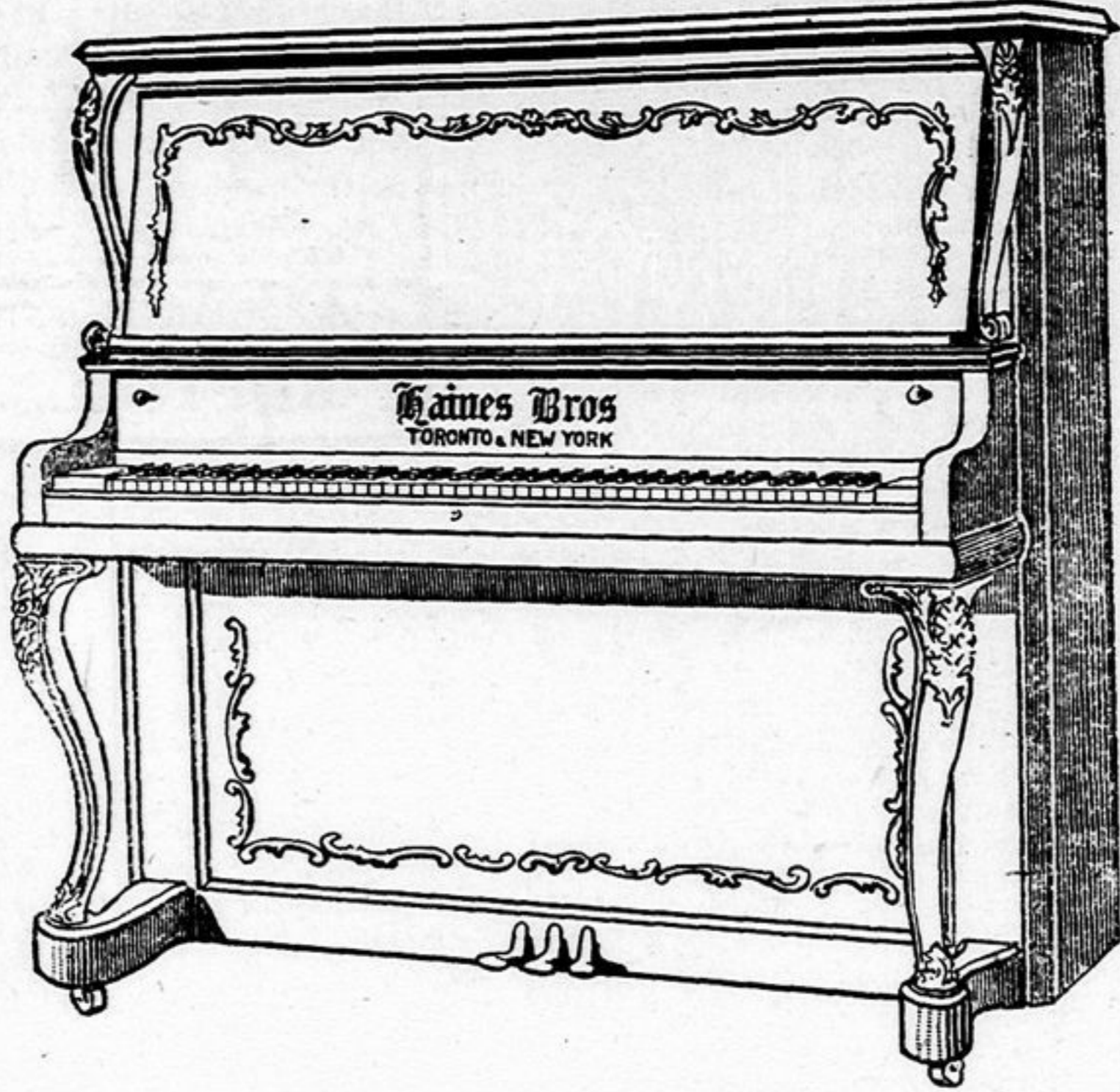

Seeding is making rapid progress. Most of the wheat is in the ground, and the farmers are busy preparing the soil for oats and barley of which greater quantities are being sown on account of the late spring.

B. J. Perrizo, of Hancock, Mich., has purchased the Roblin hotel, Roblin, from Samuel Hartford for \$20,000. C. C. Clough sold the King Edward hotel, Gilbert Plains, to J. L. Forrest, of Winnipeg, for \$15,000.

Wm. F. Luxton, founder of the Winnipeg Free Press,—Winnipeg's first school teacher—and late Inspector of Public Buildings for the Roblin Government, died May 20. Paralysis was the cause.

Fortunately she had not eaten a sufficient quantity of fish to kill her. They were thrown into the fire and partially consumed, but, when thrown on the ash heap next day, sufficient poison remained to poison several dogs.
