Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Township Council met as a Court of Revision on Assessment Roll of 1907. There were present Messrs. Muir, McLoughry, Carson, Meades and McKenzie. Each of the above as members of the said court subscribed to and made the required oath as such member, when the following appeals were heard and disposed of:

Georgian Bay Power Co., assess-ment on old Hoop and Veneer prop-erty reduced to \$1200.00.

A. & C. Munshaw, roll sustained. Edward and William O'Brien entered as tenants for lot 31, con. 14.

R. P. Legate's business assessment was struck off the roll.

Robert Swanton, assessment on lots 133 and 134 1 S. W., assessment reduced \$50 00; lots 137, 138 and 139 1 N. E., roll sustained; and as to Mr. Swanston's appeal against lot 155, 1 N. E. as being too low, roll sustained.

J. & W. Boyds' assessment on vil-lage lots 10 and 11 Toronto street and 10 and 11 Hill street was reduced \$100 00 and their assessment of pts. of lots 152 and 153, 1 S. E., reduced \$200.00

Court adjourned.

After the Court of Revision the Council met for general business, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Position of a large number of rate-payers of Priceville asking the council to take no action in the opening up of streets in Priceville until the C. P. R.'y station site is finally fixed. This was laid over for further considera-tion. Mr. Meads and Mr. Carson as committee on Priceville streets re-ported that they had interviewed Mr. J. McArthur and Mr. Riley who agreed to have fences removed in a reasonable time. Estimates from the police villages of Priceville and Flesherton for rate of 1907 were filed.

McLoughry—McKenzie—That the report of Messrs. Meads and Carson re Priceville streets be received and they be paid \$2 00 each for their ser-vices.—Carried.

Meads—McLoughry—That the vil-lage of Markdale be paid \$12 00 their account for rent of hall for Division Court for two years.—Carried.

Carson—Meads—That Lucas, Wright & McArdle's account of \$5 00 for legal services re Court of Revis-ion 1906 be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the assessor be paid \$3 00 for equalizing the assessment of the police village of Priceville and the same to be charged to said village.—Carried.

Carson—Meads—That the resig-nation of Colin McLean as pound keeper be accepted and Thos. H. Atkinson be appointed in his stead.—Carried.

McKenzie—Meads—That Robert Graham's offer to give land a rod wide lying along that part of the valley road from his deviation 73 rods south and sufficient timber for bridge on said road for the sum of \$70 00 be accepted.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That the As-sessment Roll as revised by the Court of Revision (subject to any appeals to Co. Judge) be certified by the Clerk and be the Assessment Roll for 1907.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That By-law 682 (drainage By-law No. 1) be now read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in By-law book.—Carried

DEATH PASSED HIM BY.

Fell Out of One Train, Run Over By Another.

London, June 8—A five-year-old boy fell yesterday from a train that was running near Twyford. He was not hurt and ran to rejoin the train, which his father, in the meantime, had stopped.

Before the boy reached the train an express passed along the paral-lel track upon which the youngster was running, and knocked him down, passing over him. The boy immedi-ately rose and continued to meet his father.

His head was cut and straining blood, but he was not seriously hurt.

CIVIC WELCOME.

At the recent Methodist Conference in Berlin the Mayor and Council gave the ministers and lay delegates a very warm welcome and in the course of Mayor Bricker's remarks the Daily Telegraph of that town reports him as follows:

A suspension of the order of pro-cedure was permitted and Rev S. E. Marshall, pastor Trinity Methodist Church, introduced to the President and Conference the civic deputation, composed of Mayor Bricker and Alds Uttley, Hahn, Anthes, Harrison and Feick. His worship delivered a happy address of welcome, during which he referred to Berlin's prowess as a manufacturing centre, notwith-standing its lack of natural advan-tages and during the last fifteen years the growth of the town has been steady and substantial. He pointed out that employees of years ago were now among Berlin's leading business men. He referred to the fact that there are about 80 factories of all kinds in the town, and over 200 commercial travellers are trav-elling throughout the world selling the outputs which last year amounted to nearly \$7,500,000. These factories gave employment to 8000 male and 1000 female hands and last year the wages paid amounted to about \$1,500,000. The citizens were firm believers in municipal ownership and over \$550,000 has been invested in the purchase of the water-works, the gas and electric works, and the street railway, as well as the construction of the most modern and successful sewage disposal plant on the continent, to which a great deal of credit is due to Dr. J. F. Honsberger, one of the delegates of the Conference.

The Mayor referred to the educa-tional advantages of the town and also informed the delegates of the fact that 70 per cent. of the beautiful residences of which Berlin is proud were owned by the occupants. Refer-ence was made to Victoria Park, the Carnegie Library, the splendid fire department, and in conclusion the Mayor gave the delegates the freedom of the town and expressed the hope that their visit to Berlin would be profitable and long remem-bered. The delegates tendered the delegation an ovation and on motion Mr. J. S. Deacon, of Milton, was ap-pointed to draw up a suitable resolu-tion appreciative of the welcome ex-tended by Mayor Bricker.

DEATH OF MRS JOHN FOGARTY.

Startlingly sudden was the death of Mrs. John Fogarty who passed away at her home in Glenelg on Saturday evening, at the age of fifty years. Mrs. Fogarty has been very unwell since Christmas but during the last few weeks seemed slightly improved. On Saturday evening she was sitting at tea with the family, when she gave forth signs of distress. Loving hands were at her side in an instant, but human agency was ineffective and the spirit soared away. Heart trouble was the cause of her sudden decease. Mrs. Fogarty was born near Berkeley in 1857 and is a daughter of Mr. James Quinn. To Mr. and Mrs. Fogarty were born one son and four daughters, all of whom, to gether with Mr. Fogarty, survive and deeply mourn their loss. The deceased was of a most cheerful dis-position, always looking on the bright side, and leading a most ex-emplary christian life. The funeral took place to St. John's cemetery, Glenelg, on Monday and was very largely attended. Rev. A. C. Walter, D. D., conducting the impressive burial service. The pall bearers were the Messrs. McAuliffe, brother-in-law of the deceased; John Curry, John Maher, Andrew Fogarty and Patrick Hamilton. A large number of sympathizing friends and neigh-bors mourn the passing of so amiable a lady.—Standard
