Egremont Council.

Council met June 29th. Minutes sustained. A claim for damages caused by horse breaking through culvert at Yeovil amounting to \$10, by Bunston & Manary.

McArthur—Lothian—That \$5.00 be paid in full satisfaction of said claim. Accepted—Carried.

Also a claim for damages amounting to \$200.00 caused by fire to timber belonging to D. McQueen. Said fire being started by contractor of Drain No. 3.

McArthur—Ferguson—That the reeve be instructed to investigate said claim, and report at next meeting.—Carried.

Notice from Clerk Proton, asking for a supplementary grant of \$75.00 to be expended between Cedarville and Conn. Resolved that said request lie over till next meeting.—Carried.

The reeve reported that he met the Reeve and Clerk Arthur T. p. and settled accounts of S. labor and grants on the townline for 1905 06 Egremont expended \$351.90, Arthur \$24.44, balance due Egremont \$97.46 to be spent on T. L. this season.

Comr Lothian and the Reeve—Committee appointed to examine and report upon the water grievance. Lot 27, con 14 report that they had examined locality and recommended that Council take no action and await developments.

Jno. A. Swanston and W. J. Sharp were appointed Auditors under By-law 213 to make a special audit from Jan. 1st to June 28th inc.
