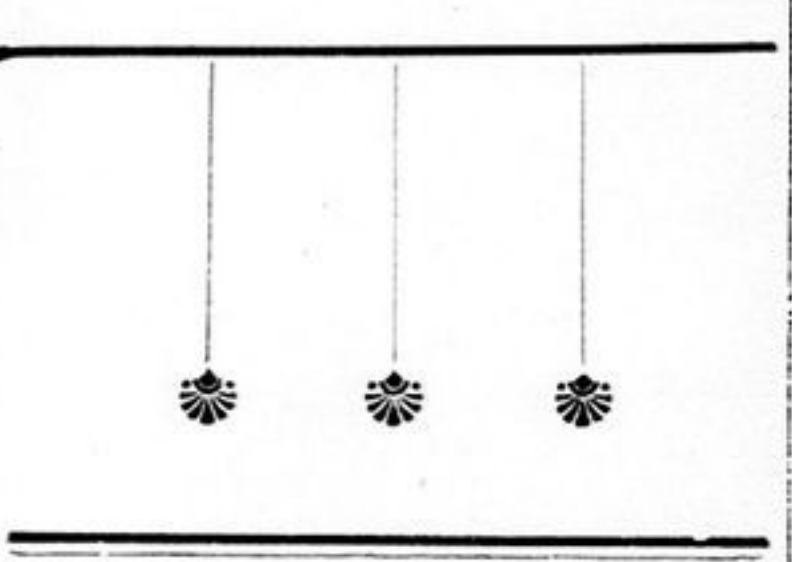

Sentence followed the recent conviction of Schmitz for extorting \$1175 from French restaurant keepers.
