DEAR SIR,-I ask your assistance to enable me to get into communication with the parents or guardians of all the blind children in Ontario, under the age of twenty one years. The the Ontario Legislature, admits as pupils "all blind youths, of both sexes, between the ages of seven and twenty one, not being deficient in intellect, and free from disease or physical infirmity, being residents of the Province of Ontario." It is not necessary that the applicant shall be totally blind; the test is inability to "read ordinary type and attend school for the seeing without serious injury to the sight." The initial difficulty is to locate the children who are eligible for admission, and it will be helpful in the future if your readers will send me the names and addresses of blind children under seven as well as of those between seven

and twenty-one.
