Children's behavior is a subject

that has been raised by Mr. Hemry O'Brien's letters to the press and the views he expresses will find many supporters. No doubt examples of juvenile boorishness and of juvenile courtesy can be found by anyone who looks for them, so not much is gained by citing examples. A case noticed on the street car the other day is haired lady was permitted to stand for several blocks, while a couple of young cubs, riding on half-fare, chewed gum and stared at her. Finally a younger woman got out of the car and the lady got a seat. The point of this story is that twenty years ago it could hardly have occurred, not alone because the boys were better trained to show respect and consideration to their elders, but because their elders were more insistent upon their own privileges. The old lady of an earlier generation would prob ably have yanked the youngster up by the ear. If not, the other passengers would have put up a cry of righteous indignation, especially the gentleman in the corner who positive ly declined to see the lady in the modern instance.
