### CHILDREN'S MANNERS

Children's behavior is a subject that has been raised by Mr. Henry O'Brien's letters to the press, and the views he expresses will find many supporters. No doubt examples of juvenile boorishness and of juvenile courtesy can be found by anyone who looks for them, so not much is gained by citing examples. A case noticed on the street car the other day is worth noting, however. A grey-haired lady was permitted to stand for several blocks, while a couple of young cubs, riding on half-fare, chewed gum and stared at her. Finally a younger woman got out of the car and the lady got a seat. The point of this story is that twenty years ago it could hardly have occurred, not alone because the boys were better trained to show respect and consideration to their elders, but because their elders were more insistent upon their own privileges. The old lady of an earlier generation would probably have yanked the youngster up by the ear. If not, the other passengers would have put up a cry of righteous indignation, especially the gentleman in the corner who positively declined to see the lady in the modern instance. It is not pertinent to remark that a few blocks earlier he was equally oblivious of the conductor. To blame the children for the decay in gentlemanly manners is not to properly address reproof. Children are, to a great extent, what their parents fail to make them, and lax manners are the result of lax home discipline. In the final analysis it may be the strenuousness of the times that is to be held responsible. Men and women are so busy chasing their separate phantoms that they no longer have time for the important and vital work of training their children. When the child's manners run counter to the parents' comfort, a threat or a blow will usually correct them for the instant, and in hundreds of cases this is about all the training the children get at home. If they do not make themselves nuisances there they are at liberty to behave as they please with others. In an earlier generation parents did not so lightly wear their responsibilities. Absolute obedience, truthfulness, cleanliness, industry and respect for older people were the cardinal virtues in those days, and they were so persistently taught that they became second nature with the children. At present we hear more of a child's right to individual development. For this the children are not to blame. The fault lies at the door of their instructors both at home and in the school room, to whom condemnation of youthful manners should be respectfully addressed.—Mail and Empire.
