Additional Locals.

THE Steamship Columbia, north-bound from San Francisco to Portland, Oregon, was wrecked on Saturday evening last and about 150 passengers drowned. There was a heavy fog and she was struck by the San Pedro and sank in eleven minutes.

THE Imperial Paper Mills at Sturgeon Falls are closed on account of labor troubles. The paper makers were discharged some time ago on account of refusal to work Sunday for less than one and one-half pay. Non-union paper makers were brought in from the United States, and then the pulp workers walked out.
