DAYS OF LONG AGO.

Standard of January 14th, 1859.

W. K. Fleisher, Alexander Irwin and John McDonald are three of the councillors elect for the township of Artemesia.

Distressing Accident—Last Thursday, a week ago to-day, Mr. Henry Kribbs and a young man named Stringer, were out in a sail-boat in the bay, somewhere in the vicinity, we are told in the neighborhood of Cape Croker, where they were caught in a storm. They were not seen to upset or go down as we can learn, but a boat was afterwards seen bottom side upwards, and a pair of oars supposed to be theirs, and some articles known to belong to Mr. Kribbs were found drifted on shore; there is no doubt that they met a watery grave.—O. S. Cornet.

(Jan. 28, 1859.)

The County Council, County of Grey, met pursuant to adjournment on Tuesday, the 25th of January, from November session, when the following Reeves and Deputy Reeves presented their certificates as having been duly elected as Reeves and Deputy Reeves for their respective municipalities for the current year 1859, viz:—

Fleisher, Reeve. Glenelg—James Edge, Reeve; Wm. Bell, Deputy Reeve. Egremont—Jas. Reid, Reeve; Wm. Stevenson, Deputy Reeve. Euphrasia—Hugh Abercrombie, Reeve.

- St. Vincent—Jas. Grier, Reeve. Collingwood—Wm. White, Reeve. Sydenham—Robert McCutcheon, Reeve; Jas. Gardiner, Deputy Reeve. Sullivan—Adam S. Elliott, Reeve. Normanby—Henry McMahon, Reeve; John Munro, Deputy Reeve. Holland—Geo. Deavitt, Reeve. Keppel and Sarawak—L. Ormiston, Reeve.

The Clerk called the Council to order, and requested them to elect a Warden from amongst themselves, when it was

Moved by Mr. Allan, seconded by Mr. McMahon, that George Jackson, Esq., be Warden of the municipality of the County of Grey for the current year.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Grier, seconded by Mr. Gamey, that W. K. Fleisher, Esq., be Warden for the municipality of the County of Grey for the current year

The amendment being put by the Clerk the vote was Yeas 6, Nays 11.

The motion being put the votes were as follows:—Yeas 13, Nays 6

The Clerk declared George Jackson duly elected Warden for the County of Grey for the year 1859.

Council adjourned till 4 p. m.

At 4 p. m. the Warden elect, Geo. Jackson, Esq., having filed his oath of office with the clerk, took his seat.

Minnutes of last session read and approved

The Warden appointed Geo. Spencer as Auditor for the current year.

Moved by Mr. Wylie, seconded by Mr. Scott, that J. C. Sprague be appointed Auditor for the current year.—Carried

Moved by Mr. Fleisher, seconded by Mr. Scott, that a committee of five members be appointed in accordance with the Statutory Rule, No. 51, to nominate the standing committees for the year.—Carried.

In accordance with the above the following persons were appointed, viz:—Messrs. Scott, Fleisher, Gamey, Reid and Grier

Moved by Mr. Grier, seconded by Mr. McCutcheon, that the Yeas and Nays be taken on the Wardenship.

The Yeas and Nays being called for first, on the motion, it being entertained by the Council, were as follows: Yeas 10, Nays 10 The Warden gave a casting vote in favor of motion.

The Yeas and Nays being taken on Wardenship, were as follows:—For Jackson 13, Fleisher 6.

On motion, made and seconded, the Council adjourned till 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The special session of the Council meeting taking place at 10 o'clock a. m. on the vote of By-law No. 57 for raising \$50,000 for Gravel Roads.

Special session Wednesday 10 a. m. Pursuant to resolution of last day's session, the Council met to take into consideration the vote and final passing of By-law No. 57 for raising \$50,000 for Gravel Roads.

Warden in the chair. Roll called. The Reeve of Proton, Mr. Duncan McMillan, having filed his certificate with the Clerk as such Reeve took his seat at the Board.

The Clerk presented to the Warden his report on the vote taken on By-law No. 57 for raising \$50,000 for Gravel Roads—the returns for the town of Owen Sound, Derby and Euphrasia not yet being received.

On motion, made and seconded, the Council adjourned for half an hour to allow time for the Messenger to procure the returns of Owen Sound and Derby.

11 a. m.—Met pursuant to adjournment. The Clerk presented the report to the Warden with returns of Owen Sound and Derby.

Moved by Mr. Abercrombie and seconded by Mr. White, that this special meeting adjourn till Friday morning at 10 a. m., and that a messenger be sent forthwith to procure the Poll Book of the township of Euphrasia on By-law No. 57, of the County of Grey, and that the expenses be defrayed by the township of Euphrasia.

The messenger was despatched in accordance with the above resolution.

Council adjourned, 3 p. m.—Met pursuant to adjournment from resolution of the evening previous. Warden in the chair.

Mr. Fleisher presented report of select committee and recommended the following persons to be appointed to the following offices:—

Finance and Assessment—Messrs. Grier, Fleisher, Reid, Edge and McCutcheon.

Roads and Bridges—Scott, Elliott, Allan, White and Bell.

Education—Gamey, McMahon, Irwin, Stephenson and McDowell.

County Property and Jail Management—Grier, Scott, Abercrombie, Fleisher and the Warden.

Printing—Deavitt, Wylie and the Clerk.

The Warden read report from County Treasurer.

On motion, made and seconded, a committee of five was appointed to consider the propriety of petitioning the Legislature for amendment to the Act requiring the registration and advertising of Deputures. The following persons were appointed such committee:—Fleisher, Scott, Allan, Grier and McCutcheon.

On motion, made and seconded, the Council adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to enable the various committees to bring in their reports.

[The following days' proceedings contain the usual routine business, only part of which we shall give.—Ed Chronicle.]

Moved by Mr. Fleisher, seconded by Mr. McCutcheon, that the blank in the Act defining the payment of Reeves and Deputy Reeves for attending County Council be \$1.50.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Grier, seconded by Mr. Gamey, that the sum of 25 cents per mile be paid Reeves and Deputy Reeves for attending County Council—the distance from their respective homes to the County Town only.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Allan, that the sum of \$1.75 be paid the messenger for each day's service to this Council.—Carried.

The following gentlemen were appointed to the office of School Superintendents, subject to provisions of the County Council:

District No. 1, Thomas Gordon; District No. 2, Mr. Ryan; District No. 3, Andrew Grier; District No. 4, William Ferguson.

The amount imposed for auctioneer License was \$4.00, which license will extend over the whole County.

Special Session—Considerable discussion ensued as to the legality of the Euphrasia poll book. The nays were designated by marks of different kinds, and a blank represented the yeas. It was accepted on the declaration of Mr. Abercrombie that it was correct.

Moved by Mr. Grier, seconded by Mr. Ormiston, that Mr. Rankin, County Surveyor, be instructed to run a line along the north of Derby, paying due regard to the township north of it, and report as to the most desirable route to the County of Bruce by that route.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Fleisher, seconded by Mr. McDowell, that the Clerk be instructed to get 250 copies of the standing rules printed, and give one to each Reeve and Deputy Reeve, and no more except on payment of 12 1/2 cents.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allan, seconded by Mr. Wylie, that if the Sheriff allows the use of the Court House to the Division Court to hold its sittings in, that the sum of three dollars be charged for each sitting, one half to be paid the gaoler for cleaning, and the other half to the County Treasurer.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Gamey, that the Clerk be instructed to procure 30 cords of wood for the use of gaol and court house, at the rate of 5s 7 1/2d per cord.—Carried.

On motion, made and seconded, the Council adjourned till the 3rd Tuesday in June.

DRAINING THE LAKES.

There has been a good deal of discussion lately among the people of Brant as to who is responsible for the repair of the bridge on the 2nd Con., north of the Durham Road, which collapsed a couple of weeks ago owing to the lowering of the water in the lakes. This chain of lakes presents an interesting study. There are half a dozen or more of them, the only connection between them being a little creek, which runs through all of them, and finally empties into the Saugen a little to the south west of Hanover. The space between two of these lakes where the bridge was located is only a few rods wide, and the sinking of the bridge is supposed to be due to the fact that the creek had been deepened in order to draw more water off the lakes. This was done to expose a great marl surface, and as the marl is used up the creek will have to be further lowered. Indeed, the time is not far distant when the lakes will disappear entirely, and then all that will be left will be the creek. The area of any of the lakes is not very extensive, while the marl ranges in depth from 4 to 8 feet. The solution of the bridge difficulty would seem to be a cement structure with an opening in the centre to permit the water to pass through. It will likely have to be constructed by the cement company.—Walkerton Telescope.
