Flesherton

Tuesday of last week being Civic Holiday here the business places were mostly closed and the day was one of leisure. The accused pleaded guilty and were each fined \$4.00 and costs, in all \$9.00 for each one. The second case, which occupied over two hours, consisted of two charges, assault and using bad language, preferred by Jas. Stinson against his uncle, Mr. Guy Orr, who denied both charges. The trouble arose over a binder transaction. Three witnesses were heard on each side which gave conflicting evidence and in order to sift the same the Magistrate reserved judgment till the next day when his decision was on the first charge, fine \$10.00 and costs \$4.95; on the second charge, fine \$1.00 and costs \$3.90, in all \$19.85.

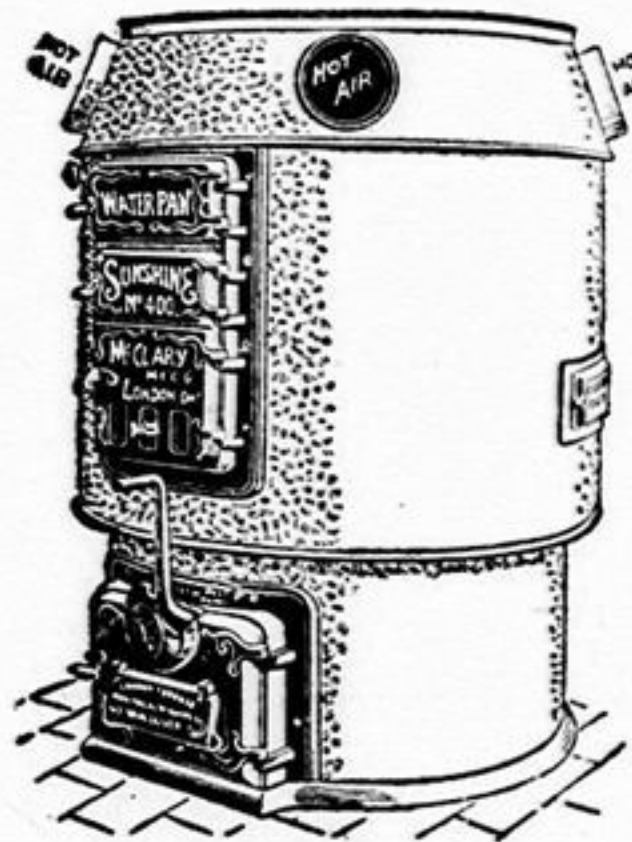
