How Columbus Missed the Honor of Discovering This Continent.

A flight of birds, coupled with a sail- or's superstition, robbed Columbus of the honor of discovering the continent. When Columbus sailed westward over the unknown Atlantic, he expected to reach Zipangu (Japan). After several days' sail from Gomera, one of the Canary Islands, he became uneasy at not discovering Zipangu, which, ac- cording to his reckonings, should have been 216 nautical miles more to the east.

If Columbus had kept to his course, he would have entered the gulf stream, have reached Florida and then proba- bly have been carried to Cape Hat- teras and Virginia.
