Ottawa, Sept. 16 .- The casualty returns of the canadian railways for the nine months ending the first of Attack of Diarrhoea Cured by One April show 460 killed and 603 injured, as follows: 42 passengers killed and 210 injured; 312 employes killed and 317 injured; 206 other persons killed and 76 injured.

The level crossing accidents show 41 killed and 22 injured. Two were working on the railway tracks; 44 on collisions.

Sixty-one bodies have been found on the railway tracks and bridges during the period in question.

manner with a drawknife. She had not shown any signs of insanity before, but had been ill. and it is supposed the murder was due to religious mania. She is probably thirty five years old. The police of Weyburn were notified of what had taken place, and Constable Ing arrested the woman, who is insane, whole being, to shake off lethargy The woman shows no remorse for what she has done and expects to be hanged. She believes it was some kind of a blood sacrifice

Later reports give fuller particulars of the horrible tragedy. The three children murdered were a baby eighteen months old. and two boys, six and nine years old, respectively. She also made a desperate attempt to kill her eleven year-old daughter. She put a rope around the girl's neck. but the child struggled bravely and was assisted by a dog, which attacked the maddened mother.


