May End the World.

Professor Matteucci, the distinguished scientist and authority on Vesuvius, states that toward the end of March the substance of the new comet discovered by Signor Marchetti will come into contact with the atmosphere of the earth. The consequences, he foresees, may be dangerous to the earth.

His brother is of the same opinion as to the peril of the earth. Both astronomers hold that if the actual nucleus of the comet is merely crossed by the earth, the danger will be brief, though necessarily acute. If, however, the earth collides with not the nucleus but the tail of the comet, our atmosphere will probably be ignited, and every trace of life will be immediately and violently destroyed.

Professor Matteucci adds that other important phenomena are to be expected as the result of the recent appearance of a huge spot on the sun.

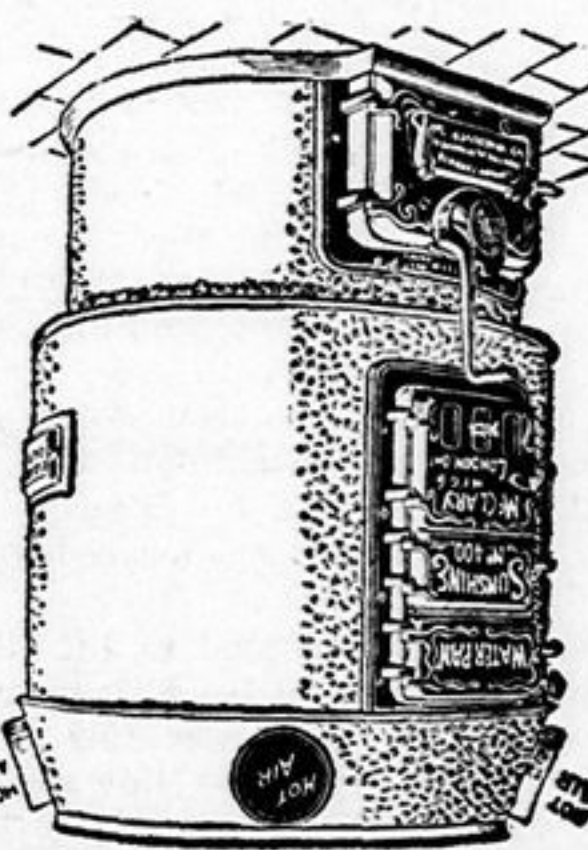
