Mr. Joseph Gamey, father of Mr. R. R. Gamey, M. P. P., died suddenly at his home in Gore Bay at 11.30 on Saturday night. Mr. Gamey had called several times during the day at his son's store, and went to bed at about 11 o'clock, apparently in good health. Half an hour later his wife heard him breathe heavily. Before a physician arrived he had expired.
