Flesherton

The Flesherton—Rockvale Baptist church held its quarterly business meeting in the church here on Monday evening of last week. The report of the treasurer, the best the church has received in years, showed that for the quarter ending Sept. 30th the following amounts had been received:—For building purposes \$12,050; for missions \$350; on ministers salary \$42 25; sabbath collections \$3768. Total, \$243.08. All accounts were settled and a small balance left with the treasurer. Arrangements are being made to reduce the amount received from the Home Mission Board for the work here.

Wilson, of Markdale, occupied the pulpit and in the course of his able sermon based on 1 Chron. 21: 26-27, showed that upon the setting up of an altar by David blessing came upon Israel so upon the establishment and observance of worship in all lands does God manifest in blessing.
