A NEW SET OF SCHOOL BOOKS.

The Minister of Education has definitely decided to prepare a new set of Public school readers for the schools of the province. This decision is in accord with the views of educationists generally.

In carrying out this project the Minister will entrust the work to Dr. D. J. Goggin, who will be authorized to consult, from time to time, with a committee of teachers, whose knowledge of Public schools and whose literary attainments will ensure the preparation of a highly desirable series. In addition to this committee, the members of the Advisory Council and other educationists will be shown advance proofs of the books during the course of preparation, so that expert advice and opinion will be taken advantage of.

The Consultative Committee, who will assist Dr. Goggin in his labors, will include W. Aikin, St. Thomas, school inspector for Elgin; Prof. Alexander, University of Toronto; G. E. Broderick, principal of the Lindsey Model School; N. W. Campbell, Durham, inspector for South Grey; T. A. Craig, Kemptville, inspector for Leeds; Inspector Hughes, Toronto; Principal Ward, Toronto; Dr. Waugh, Whiteby, inspector for Ontario County; Principal Young, of the Guelph Model School.

Dr. Goggin, the managing editor, has had long experience, both as teacher as administrator and as a maker of text books. In Ontario he taught in both rural and urban Public schools, and in Model and High schools. As the head of the Normal training school in Manitoba, he had much to do with organizing and developing the system in that province. Later on, as superintendent of Education for the Territories, he organized the school system there. While in Manitoba he devoted special attention to text books, and has a practical knowledge of binding and the mechanical processes of book making.

At the last meeting of the Ontario Educational Association the following resolution was adopted:—

"That the Ontario readers, after 20 years of service, should now give place to a set of readers that would reflect more correctly our nationality of to-day; that would be more in accord with educational principles in character of matter, arrangement and adaptation to the needs of the various grades; that would be models of excellence in illustration, type paper and binding; and, that a separate reader be supplied for the work of each grade."
