Flesherton

The annual convention of East and Centre Grey Prohibition Alliance was held in the town hall here on Tuesday of last week. At the afternoon Session presided over by the Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, of Markdale, Messrs. C. A. Fleming and Wm. Legate, active temperance workers in Owen Sound, were present and lent much to the interest of the meeting. Mr. Fleming in an instructive manner dealt with local option conditions in Owen Sound showing that the measure was working effectively. At the evening meeting there was a good sized audience and after adopting the report of the Nominating Committee the chair was vacated by Rev. Mr. Wilson in favor of the newly elected president, Rev. Dr. Caldwell of this place. The remaining officers elected were:—1st Vice Pres., Rev. G. C. Little; 2nd Vice Pres., Rev. L. F. Kipp; 3rd Vice Pres., Rev. J. S. I. Wilson; Sec., T. R. McKenzie; Treas., W. H. Thurston. Local Vice Presidents:—Artemesia, W. J. Armstrong; Holland, James Lyons; Collingwood, Rev. Geo. Lawrence; Thornbury, E. Raymond; Osprey, A. N. Brownridge; Euphrasia, B. Conn; Sullivan, Rev. Thos. Watson. Mr. Fleming, who was leaving on the 8:50 train again spoke briefly in the course of his remarks warmly congratulating the temperance people of this community on the splendid new hotel erected here. The speaker gave a flat denial to the report that liquor was being sold in the two temperance hotels in Owen Sound. Rev. W. N. Chantler, of Owen Sound, was the principal speaker for the evening and his eloquently delivered address loaded with facts and convincing argument in behalf of local option in Owen Sound and elsewhere was intently listened to throughout. Rev. Mr. Wilson followed with a short address in his usual fluent and able manner.

A resolution was adopted expressing to the Government dissatisfaction at the unfair three-fifths clause in the new license act. A vote of thanks was tendered Rev. Chantler and Messrs. Fleming and Legate for their visit and very highly prized assistance at the Convention. The meeting was closed with the National Anthem. During the evening nearly \$600 of stock in the new hotel was taken by subscribers.

Rev. G. W. Hewitt of Orangeville, again supplied the Methodist pulpit on Sunday. His sermon in the morning on "The Year of Jubilee," was a thoughtful and instructive discourse. At the Presbyterian church Rev. G. C. Little commenced a series of sermons on the book of Esther, his theme being "A Great Feast and What Came of it." The discourse was thoughtful and the lessons taught were morally and spiritually uplifting. In the Baptist church Rev. L. F. Kipp spoke on "The Character of Christ's Words," in his usual earnest and helpful manner. On Sabbath next Rev. Dr. Caldwell hopes to be able to resume his work and will conduct the regular quarterly Communion service.

At the annual business meeting of the Flesherton branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society held in the Baptist Church last week, officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, Charles Stewart; Secretary, L. F. Kipp; Treasurer, W. H. Bunt; Auditors, T. R. McKenzie and Rev. G. C. Little.

The Treasurer's report showed the income for the past year to be \$66.55. At a meeting of citizens in the Town hall on Monday evening of last week band matters received attention. It was resolved that the organization be continued under the management of the citizens' committee who were elected as follows: President, W. J. Bellamy; Vice-President, J. E. Walker; Sec., C. H. Munshaw; Treasurer, George Mitchell; General Manager, W. H. Thurston. F. Tucker will be retained as Bandmaster and under his leadership and the new management the band will doubtless prosper.

Union Thanksgiving service will be held in the Methodist church on Thursday at 10:30 a. m. when Rev. J. C. Little will preach. The day should not be wholly given to recreation and for one hour at least the house of God should be filled with worshippers desirous of expressing gratitude for the blessings of the year.

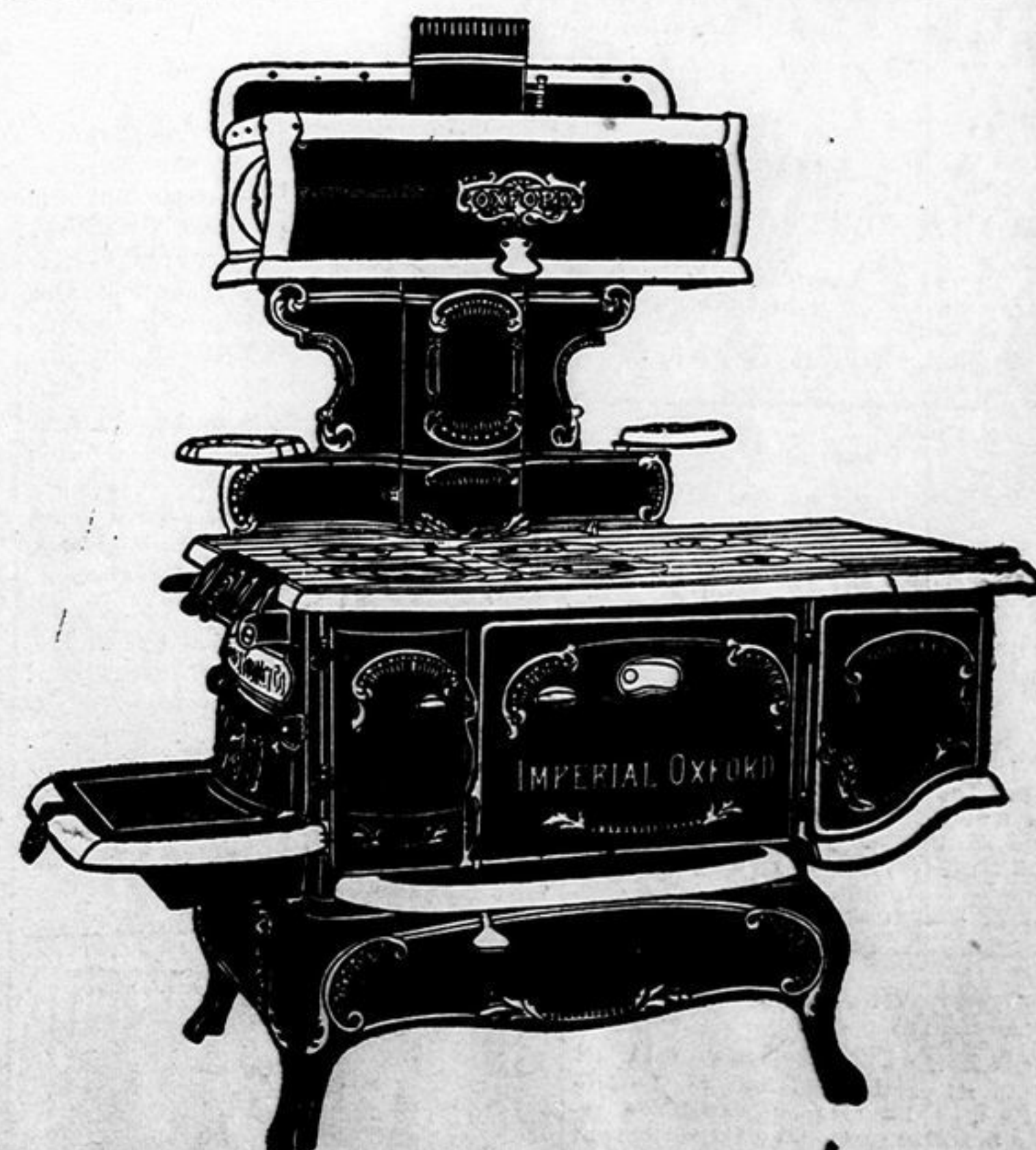
