Egremont Council.

Council met Nov. 16th. Minutes approved. Communications read from Clerk of the Peace certifying to list of Jurors received.

Sawyer-Massey and Mr. Egan re accounts.—Clerk to investigate these.

Comr. McArthur reported several road jobs, chiefly culverts, two of these were put in by Engineer's award. Total costs \$42.35. Report adopted. Comr. fees, \$5 00.

Comr. Ferguson reported expending \$51 00 in his division. A large amount was on O. S. E. Normanby, paying half cost. Comr. fees \$3 00.

Comr. Lothian reported an expenditure of \$214.00. In this a new bridge by Chas. McInnis, Lot 15, Con. 13, \$155.00. The remainder minor jobs thru out his division. Fees, \$6.00.

Comr. Philip reported having interviewed Dr. Ferry re damage to horse and buggy. Recommended settlement Egremont's share \$5 00. Road improvements amounted to \$55 25.

Ferguson—McArthur—Report adopted. Comr fees, \$3.00.

Comr. Philip Inspector of drains reported inspection of drain No. 4. Recommended payment of \$245.00 to D. Shea and drain No. 1, payment of \$290.00 to Jno. Ellis. S. Robb for tile and hauling \$16 25, charged to drain No. 1. Fees, \$1 50 for each inspection.

Reeve reported on special grant made in 1906, on Egremont and Arthur townline by Co. Wellington \$100 and \$50 each Arthur and Egremont. Robt. Hunter, contractor, as follows:—80 yds gravel at 90c, \$72.00; 100 yds. at 75c., \$75.00; Total \$147.00. Also 100 yds. gravel from Jas. Egan, at 10c., \$10.00; 80 yds. from Mrs. Cooper at 8c., \$6.40; Mr. Kenny spreading gravel, \$10.00; Total \$175.00, of said amount Egremont has paid \$10.00, Arthur \$43. Wellington \$87.00. Total \$140.50 Bal. due contractor, from Egremont including payment for gravel and spreading \$34 50.

Ferguson—Lothian—Report adopted and order for \$34 50 be drawn in favor of contractor. Fees \$3.00.

Reeve reported on Watson's water grievance. Had visited the parties but failed to agree, was notified that legal proceedings would be taken, then called a meeting on Nov 15th under the D. & W. C. Act but no agreement could be made. Recommended that Engineer be asked to make an award. Report was adopted. Reeve was paid \$3.00 under said Act.

A supplementary By Law No. 215 to inable Trustees of S. No. 7 to issue Debentures amounting to \$400, in order to complete their new school was passed.

John Manary was paid \$20 for farm road crossing on drain No 3, charged to said drain. Jas. Shea was paid \$473.89, on drain No. 3 Wm Watson, Jas. Lamont and R. Lamont were each paid 50c communication tax.

Resolved that the following accounts be paid:—O. M. Seim printing tax receipts etc \$5 25; Philip Harper gravel \$1 45; Jas. Eccles do \$3.13; Reeve selecting Jurors \$3 00; Clerk do \$3 00; Reeve 1/2 day Proton townline \$1 50; W. Aberdeen 1/2 day on grader \$1 00; Alex McGillivray conveying Duncan McLaughlan to House of Refuge, Markdale, \$1.00

Adjourned to meet on Dec. 16th, according to statute.

A VISITOR FROM BRITISH COLUMBIA.

We had a very pleasant call last week from Mr. Wm. Rose, of Chilliwack, B. C. He is a son of Mr. Hugh Rose, of this town, and has been in British Columbia for the past twenty-two years. His home in the Frazer Valley is one of the most fertile spots in the vast province of British Columbia, if not of the whole world. The alluvial deposits of ages have been carried down by the Frazer River from the higher lands above, giving the valley an immense depth of the most productive soil, which is almost inexhaustible in its fertility.

Mr. Rose was at the recent horticultural show in Toronto, where he had on exhibition several specimens of the fruit products of British Columbia. When the collection was made it was late in the season, and the selection was only an average of what the country produces in the way of fruit. Some of it was on exhibition here for a time, and we can assure our readers that finer looking fruit would be hard to find.

The Province of British Columbia, as most of our readers know, is extremely mountainous and is not generally suited to agriculture. It is, for the most part, a mining country, and beneath the soil lies its chief wealth. The valleys, however, are extremely fertile, and vast crops of all kinds may be garnered from them. As much as six or seven tons of hay is frequently taken from an acre of land, and other crops are proportionately large.

Speaking of soil, Mr. Rose told of "driving a pump" 68 feet without meeting an obstruction. They never dig wells where he came from; they simply drive tubing into the ground, screw on a section and drive again, repeating as often as necessary to reach the gravel, when an abundance of water is secured.

The New Senator.

Senator George Casimir Dessaulle has been appointed to the place in the Canadian upper House left vacant by the death of Sir William Hingston. The new Senator, a leading citizen of St. Hyacinthe, is a son of the late Seigneur Jean Dessaulles and a nephew of the famous patriot, Papineau born at St. Hyacinthe in 1837, he took his classical course in the college of that city. He afterwards studied law, but never took up the practice of that profession. He commenced to take a deep interest in municipal matters when quite a young man, and after serving as a councillor for several years, was elected as mayor of St. Hyacinthe for nearly a quarter of a century. He has been president of the Bank of St. Hyacinthe since 1878. A life-long Liberal, he was frequently asked to enter public life, but steadily refused until the general elections of 1897, when he was elected to the Local Legislature. He has also been for some years president of the local St. Jean Baptiste Society.

Wintering Dahlia Tubers.

As soon as the tops are killed by the frost they should be cut off to within six inches of the ground. The tubers may then be dug and inverted in the ground, to permit the sap remaining in the plant to settle without dripping among the tubers, as it is believed the sap is an injury to the roots. After the plants become dry they may be placed in a cellar in boxes or baskets and kept dry, but not permitted to shrivel. Any condition suitable for good care of potatoes is favorable for wintering dahlia tubers. The tubers are very susceptible to injury from freezing.—Country Gentleman.

To Help the Divers.

The difficulty a diver experiences in lifting weights beneath the water is partly overcome by a new Italian invention, which has been formally adopted by that government. The mechanism is a diving suit, the artificial arms of which are worked from the inside by the wearer. The leverage thus secured enables the diver to lift objects heavier than he could otherwise handle. In addition to this improvement over the old method, a high power electric light that will penetrate the water for some distance is placed in the helmet.
